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FARMING AS A BUSINESS

"Legislation can help agriculture help itself," Governor McMullen declared in an address before delegates attending the convention of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers at Grand Island, Nebraska.

The governor declared that the farmer does not ask the government to step in and manage his affairs, but does ask that he be aided in working out his own problems. He urged less talk, less thoughtless opposition, and above all, something tried.

"Agriculture is not a local industry in which only the people of the farming communities are directly interested," Governor McMullen said. "It is national in its scope."

"It represents an investment of over \$8,000,000,000. In economic matters agriculture must be taken for what it is, namely, our basic industry, and our largest industry. If it can be helped through legislation as other industries are helped then the help should be forthcoming."

"If the tariff system benefits industry as it most certainly does, then it should benefit agriculture. But agriculture must first put itself in position to receive such benefit. As it is now, it is helped by the tariff only in form instead of in fact. Its protection through the tariff is on paper instead of on the farm. But that is not the fault of the tariff. It is the fault of agriculture itself. One obstacle is in the way of help through the tariff has been crop surpluses."

"So long as there is a surplus of any crops, the surplus must be sold in competition with world production, and the world price received for the surplus is the price that has been accepted for the major portion of the crop. That is wrong and in every way is unbusinesslike. It's the tail wagging the dog."

"Agriculture is not asking special favors of the government and it is not asking the government to step in and manage the farmers' affairs. It simply wants help to which it is entitled, the same kind of help the government has given industry, labor and finance. And there is another thing agriculture wants: It wants less talk, less criticism, less thoughtless opposition and more action. It wants something tried."

At a dinner given by the Layman's Advisory Board of the World Alliance for International Friendship Through the Churches, held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, New York City, on the evening of February 18, Channing Pollock, "American dramatist," violently attacked the American people declaring that "ninety per cent of our people are morons" and that "because of our money we are boastfully certain that we are the masters of the world, and do both see that from one end of the earth to the other our prosperity has inspired hatred, as our ignorance and vulgarity have inspired derision." Some movements to "promote international friendship" seem to be more concerned at times in fomenting hatred of the United States.

Winter wheat production in the United States next year will be considerably in excess of probable domestic requirement if reported intentions of farmers to increase acreage some 4,000,000 acres above last year are carried out and average yields are secured, the Department of Agriculture points out in a wheat outlook report. This situation, the department says, would place winter wheat on a world market basis. The fact that our market is now on approximately a domestic basis is considered largely to have brought about the present favorable market position of the wheat producers.

Experiment stations are trying out electric power for farm purposes. Electrification is being obtained for dairy refrigeration, milk coolers, water supply, house lights, electric ranges, washing machines, milking machines, cream separators, and other power uses. Here in Oregon, where millions of horse-power of electric energy is going bowling along to the sea unharnessed, it takes about all we can rake and scrape together to pay our household bills.

THINGS WORTH REMEMBERING

When using the furnace this winter, place potatoes to bake, beans to bake, steak to broil or roast to roast, in the furnace or on the ledge. This will save fuel and the food has a different flavor. Onions roasted in their skins are especially delicious. Remove the outside and serve with butter.

When the screw tops of cans fail to respond to the hand, try using a little sandpaper. Another use for sandpaper is on a zinc table when the meat chopper is to be fastened on; place a strip under the clamps to hold it firmly.

When straightening the hem in linen, save all the drawn threads to be used for darning old linens.

For those who dislike dusting, bed-making and many of the everyday household duties, start the victrola with a lively tune and work to the time of the music. It will take all the drudgery out and time will pass swiftly.

Slip-on covers for ironing boards are easy to wash and keep the board always fresh if one has two or three on hand.
