

O.A.C. Honor System Interesting Schools

That every high school student should be familiar with the principles of a student honor system is the belief of the O. A. C. student body as expressed by its honor council.

The purpose of such a system is to foster and maintain a high standard of honor among all students in academic work, both high school and college. At O. A. C. the honor system is under the exclusive administration of the student body, its action being subject only to the approval of the president of the college. It applies to every registered student and prevails in the administration of all academic student affairs, including examinations, class work and written assignments.

Realizing that the final success of any honor system depends largely on the removal of causes of dishonesty, the committee emphasizes the following provisions:

"Students observing or having knowledge of any violation of the honor system are in honor bound to report such violations to the chairman of the honor committee.

"Students observing practices in the course of an examination that appear to be a violation of the honor system but who are not certain of such violation, may tap audibly on the desk as a warning, but such warning shall not be deemed necessary before reporting obvious violations.

"The accused shall be notified in each case to appear before the committee and enter a plea, but in case he fails to appear, or to submit acceptable explanation, he is automatically suspended from the institution.

"Penalty for violation of the honor system shall not be less than the loss of five college credits, nor more than expulsion from the institution. Publication of the name of the offender with the summary of the evidence may be included in the penalty imposed by the committee. All sentences shall be final, subject only to the approval of the president of the college."

The success of the O. A. C. honor system has been made more outstanding by the fact that such a system has recently failed at several large institutions in the west.
