### High School Notes

The debate which was held in the Athena school auditorium last Friday evening resulted in a win for the McLoughlin team. Judges were here from Hood River and Heppner. As a result of this decision Milton will represent this district in the eastern Oregon contest.

Hillsboro and Independence high schools have been suspended from the state athletic association because they sanctioned soccer and watch for awards for their athletics. The rules state that no student shall receive a sweater or other article as a reward.

#### Science Program

The Science classes had charge of the assembly program last Friday, the following is a synopsis of their program:

Some interesting electrical experiments were demonstrated with the aid of the static machine by Ray Johnston and Granville Cannon.

Ralph McEwen gave a talk upon the harmful effects of tobacco, alcohol and narcotics.

Alberta Charlton illustrated with chemicals the processes through which the food passes in its course through the body.

Armond Bell and Carl Calvert gave several experiments upon atmospheric pressure. The most interesting was the crushing of a can, this was done by the aid of an exhaust pump.

Experiments in different kinds of gases were given by Fred Radtke and Alvin Anderson. They showed the mysterious actions of hydrogen gases, and exploded a bell jar full of hydrogen and air.

A demonstration of the principles of the electric bell was given by John Kirk.

Changes of pressure thru the use of siphons and the diving bell were performed by LaVone Pittman and Sarah Belle Jantzen.

Ronald Liewallen, the school magician performed some uncanny tricks with chemical magic and optical illusions.

The program ended with a demonstration of how electricity kinks the muscles when passed thru the body under high voltage but practically zero quantity. Using a telephone magnet geared up, Mr. Stolze sent a very small current around a

chain of boys and girls, giving them all a feel of how electricity prickles and contracts the muscles. Though some were raised up on their toes, none felt the effects five minutes afterward, and many wanted a second chance.

#### Dixie Jubilee Quartet

"The Dixie Jubilee Quartet," also known as the "Grouch Removers," will appear in the high school auditorium Tuesday, March 29, at 8 P. M.
