This is the third major campaign of the Walton League to be undertaken during the past five years. The first was the creation of the Upper Mississippi River Wild Life and Fish Refuge, 300 miles long and comprising the bottom lands of the Mississippi river from Lake Pepin, Minnesota, to Rock Island, Illinois. Easter Island Statue May Be Earth's Oldest

The world's most ancient statue is to be found outside, not inside, the British museum,

It is said that it took two hundred men from the crew of H. M. S. Topaz, and three hundred natives, to drag the statue from its original site, although it weighs only four tons. It is the work of a race of huge builders and was one of many similar colossal statues, some of them weighing as much as a hundred tons, scattered wer Easter Island, in the Pacific. These hideous images were origiully supplied with hats, in some uses weighing another five or six ous, which were red because they were made of tufa or volcanic rock. All the bats have fallen off now and ire found lying around the huge statues as though there had been a

ulgh wind. This race of ancient builders left traces in the shape of immense stone nonuments right across the Pacific, and many archeologists think that the sland on which these monuments are found is the last remnant left above the surface of a vast submerged continent. There is nothing which fixes the exact period of this achievement, but it is possible that the statues are at least as old as the pyramids of Egypt.






