To Charles Foster, Defendant above named:

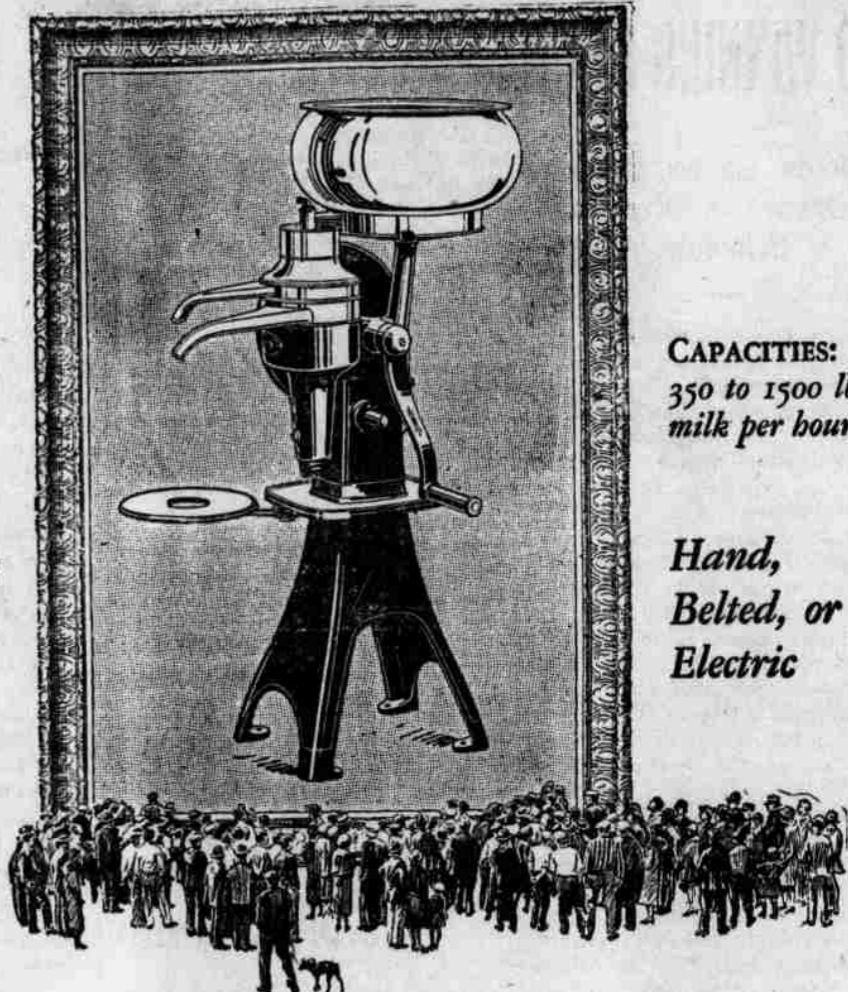
