Athena high school football team defeated the Weston eleven 6-0 Friday, November 16, in a hard fought game on the Weston field.

Weston won the toss and elected to receive. The Athena captain chose to defend the west goal. Weston received the ball on the ten yard line and advanced it to the 15-yard line. Two plays failed to gain. On the third play a Weston fumble was recovered and carried across the goal line for a touchdown by Pinkerton, left end for Athena. The kick for point after touchdown failed. Weston chose to receive but was forced to kick.

The second quarter was played mostly in neutral territory. Athena completed two passes for yardage but lacked the necessary punch to take advantage of them.
