TAXING MINES IN UTAH

The Manufacturer and Industrial News Bureau has this to say regard-

To the average person, this would not seem a difficult matter. However, mine taxation, due to peculiarities innate in the industry, is a mystery to other real estate, become less valuable as they are developed. Every ton of ore taken out of a mine makes it just that much less valuable. On the other hand every ton of crop taken off a properly managed farm adds to the value of the property.

There were fewer beef cattle on farms and ranges in the United States at the beginning of this year than at any previous time in half a century, says C. R. Arnold of Ohio University. He says that in 1895 there were 40,000,000 beef cattle on farms and ranges. This number declined to 33,000,000 in 1904, but by 1907 the number had risen to 38,000,-000, then dropped to 27,000,000 head in 1914. War demands increased herds to about 36,000,000 in 1919, after which prices declined and the number was exceptionally low from 1920 to 1926. There were about 24,000,000 head on farms and ranges at the beginning of this year but the number is beginning to increase.
