NORBLAD'S RENUNCIATION (Morning Oregonian) Governor Norblad's announcement that he will not again become a candidate for governor this year because of his regard for the primary verdict whereby he failed to obtain the nomination would have been received by the public as a gesture of good sportsmanship had he not immediately spoiled it all by attacking M. F. Corrigan, W. C. North and R. W. Sawyer again in an attempted justification of his own acts in removing them from office.

Nor is Governor Norblad very convincing when he attempts to draw a parallel between his own removal of Mr. Sawyer and the prior removal of William Doby from the highway commission at the time of Mr. Sawyer's appointment to that body. Mr. Doby, a democrat, was removed by a republican governor in order to bring a majority of the commission into political harmony with a republican administration, just as a democratic governor in the preceding administration had removed a republican commissioner in order to make the commission majority democratic.

The bete noir that has been at the governor's heels from the first moment of his coming into the succession has been his own predilection, amounting to a negative genius, for doing and saying the wrong thing. Apparent all along his course, that trait again shows up in the manner of his renunciation.
