The constant drive for thrift is having effect not only among the older people, but is spreading to school children, as seen by the report of sixty-one savings banks formed in as many Chicago public schools last year. The report shows that 13688 children saved \$27,115.94, and of this amount \$11,200.90 has been transferred to regular banks. Six pupils of the seventh and eighth grades conducted the banks. Any sum from five cents up may be deposited, and as soon as a pupil's account amounts to \$5 it is transferred to a regular bank and an account with the pupil is opened. It is reasonable to suppose that rural schools will adopt the teaching of thrift as a subsidiary course. The town and rural district schools have the same opportunity to learn economy and thrift.

A good way to kill a town is to close all places of amusement on Sunday so that people will go elsewhere for entertainment; to send away from town for shoes, drygoods, clothing, building materials, printing, etc.; to vote down all propositions and bonds to make public improvements; to drive out all contractors and their crews and thus minimize public expenditure; to see to it that no corporation of public utility makes any profit on its investment and keep all foreign capital out. With that kind of policy it won't take long to kill a good town.

Beginning with the last Oregon legislative session, there is a great movement on in not only the state but in county and city governments as well to lighten the tax burden. Oregon lowered the state levy, reduced appropriations and trimmed down commissions, consolidated bureaus and lowered salaries. The cities and towns and counties are following up the policy. The result will be a reduction of

millions of dollars to the taxpayers' load, better business conditions and more employment for labor. Still there is much that can be done in way of retrenchment.

Work will be commenced soon on the Beaverton high school.
