ARTIFICIAL PERFUMES.

It is a Wise Flower That Knows Its Own Sweet.

There are few perfumes today that cannot be made from chemicals, synthetically, as the chemists call it. Formerly all perfumes were extracted from flowers, fruits, spices, woods or other vegetable and animal substances. The first perfume to be imitated was vanilla, in 1876. Heliotropine followed, being obtained by oxidation of a by-product of ammonia.

Terpitol is one of the most costly and costly of perfumes. This is a clear solution of turpentine. With this, a little oil and a quart of a chemical can produce a perfume that can scarcely be distinguished from those extracted by the life of the valley, blue and yellow, varying according to the properties in which the chemicals are blended.

Artificial violet is a combination of citral and essence extracted from lemon, orange, Indian yervains or lemon verbena with coumarin acetate, a substance very like pyrolytic acid.

No chemist has been able to counterfeit musk, but a synthetic perfume called musk is made from toluene, a by-product of benzine and coal tar. This is changed to a complex carburet, treated with amoxic and sulphuric acids, is diluted and sold as musk.

Most of the cheap perfumes are imitations, and they are almost always inferior to the flower extracts. So it might properly be said that it is a wise flower that knows its own perfume. *New York World.*
