It is modern in every detail, and is by far the "classiest" little mansion that has yet been constructed within the limits of this city. The style and architecture is refreshingly new, and certainly is a real addition to the town.

We copy the following from the Hillsboro Independent:

The Washington county levy for 1916 is 16 1/2 mills, a quarter mill greater than 1915. This levy applies, however, only to districts in which a high school is maintained, which are Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Tualatin, Beaverton and Oregon. In other districts a levy to meet the high school fund provided by the last legislature of 6 of a mill is made, and the total levy in these districts is 17 1/2 mills.

The completed figures, as given out by the county court, show radical changes from last year's totals. The grand total of the budget was \$325,590.26, and the state tax was estimated at \$89,600, making a total of state and county of \$415,190.27. The state tax actually levied totals \$72,855.41, \$16,741.59 less than the estimate, with reductions made by the county the total of both state and county is \$366,512.03. Eliminating the high school fund the total is \$358,277.66, as compared with \$337,500 for 1915. In this year's total is included \$31,000 for the Hillsboro-Forest Grove road.
