MEASURES ON STATE BALLOT.

Here is something for the voters to think over as expounded by the St. Helens Mist. These, we judge, are several of the more rational ones.
At least six initiative petitions proposing constitutional amendments and laws and three measures referred to the people by the last legislature will be on the ballot at the election next November. Initiative petitions which will be on the ballot are as follows:
To provide for one day of rest in seven, and setting apart Sunday as a day of public rest, and excepting necessary occupations and employments. Proposed by the Weekly Rest Day League of Portland.
To abolish Sunday closing law, repealing section 2125 of title 19, Lord's Oregon Laws. Initiated by Independent Retailers' Association of Portland.
To prohibit compulsory vaccination and medical treatment. Initiated by Lora C. Little of Portland.
Proposing law to "protect salmon in the Columbia River and its tributaries and barring fishing with seines, traps or fish wheels." Initiated by Clackamas County Fishermen's union.
To remove county seat of Jefferson county from Culver to Madras. Proposed by "Madras for County Seat Club."

The three proposed constitutional amendments referred to the people by the legislature are senate joint resolutions Nos. 19, 18 and 22.
No. 12 proposes amending section 16 of article 5 of the constitution so as to give the governor power to veto single items in appropriation bills.
No. 13, amending article 9 of the constitution, would exempt from taxation until 1935, except taxes for state purposes, all vessels of 50 tons and more capacity engaged in coast or foreign trade, which are registered in Oregon.
No. 22 proposes to repeal section 6 of article 2 of the constitution, which reads: "No negro, Chinaman or mulatto shall have the right of suffrage."

RICHARD HARDING DAVIS.
In the passing of Richard Harding Davis, America loses one of her most brilliant authors, a man who has chalked his name high on the roll of honor. True, it is said of his works that they will not endure; but is this the honest way to look at them? Certainly not; for he has written at least two novels, characterizing life so well that they must ultimately be placed on the shelf beside the other great novels of the past age.

The list of his works contain a large collection of tales and books, but his short stories; and indeed many of his novels although they are excellent in diction and vigorous in plot, were rather the foam of literature than the substantial, enduring kind. They were written more to amuse than to withstand the rigors of criticism; more for the purpose of creating a novelty than to leave a permanent impression.

He was looked upon as the greatest of war correspondents. Indeed he was a veteran, with a kick to the products of his pen that were read and enjoyed by the world. His stories capped the front page of every journal of any note throughout the breadth of America, and his writings

have been diligently sought after by the reading public.
In the course of his life he has been the follower of numerous armies, and the chronicler of five wars, and his pen has undoubtedly helped to record history, even though it is only the passing history written upon the front page of the Sunday edition.

HOW SHALL WE DECIDE.

The time will soon come when the taxpayers of Washington county will be given a chance to exercise their right of franchise in choosing the nominees for the different offices. We hope that the verdict will be rendered with a view of economy and efficiency in office. However, we feel as though such a warning is uncalled for but nevertheless because of the urgent need of economy we desire that all good citizens scrutinize all candidates carefully before the primaries.

It isn't enough that a candidate promise economy but he should have the business ability to determine between true economy and that kind of economy that is of the "penny wise and pound foolish" kind. All candidates are running upon an economy platform but is it the kind of economy that we desire? That will be the question for us to determine.

Colonel Roosevelt can truly claim to be a peacemaker and a peacekeeper. He ended the Russo-Japanese war and prevented the war between the United States and Japan. He stopped the blockade of Venezuela without bloodshed. He preserved peace with honor, because he let the world know that, if a blow was struck at the American nation, it would strike back. His successor has preserved peace without honor because he has given the world to understand that, when a blow is struck at this nation, it will not strike back. The difference between Colonel Roosevelt and President Wilson is not the difference between the one who aches for a fight and one who loves peace; it is the difference between different kinds of peace lovers.

All indications point to the nomination by the republicans of Hughes for president notwithstanding the fact that he still withholds his consent. The occasion calls for a more positive and specific refusal, on his part

if his admirers are to be turned away from him.
We don't know how others feel about it but it looks somewhat as though the Grand Jury had been overworked the past year. It would be nice to give them a vacation of about six months. It would be a relief to them as well as to the taxpayers of Washington county if such a vacation were granted.

Uncle Sam is to be told by Carranza how far he shall go in pursuit of Villa and how many men he shall use and what their equipment shall be. Carranza should limit the pursuit to a squad of boy scouts armed with bean shooters.

It looks as though the chase might soon end unless Carranza is told plainly that it is Villa we want and must have at all cost. Thus the peace and dignity of the democratic party might be upheld.
