BOOSTERS SHOW PLEASES MANY

Crowds From Surrounding Country Attend

From over the entire east end of Washington county and also Hillsboro and Forest Grove came large crowds to attend the big entertainment given by the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night in the Grange hall. The streets were lined for some distance with autos and many came in on the cars. About fifty of the Hillsboro Commercial Club were present.

The chief events of the evening were vaudeville stunts by Portland talent engaged for the occasion, consisting of singing, dancing, impersonation, and sleight of hand, all of which were very good in their line. One of the headliners, however, was not present and his place could not be filled on the short notice given, but with the exception of this one event everything went as per schedule, and the crowd dispersed at the close of the program well pleased with the evenings entertainment.

As the evening was for the purpose of raising funds to replenish the rapidly diminishing Chamber of Commerce treasury, it was fully up to all expectations when the receipts were counted. When the entire amount is totaled and all bills paid there

will probably be a fund of \$50 left to carry on the work that the organization has laid out for themselves.

The well packed house was a good example of the work and influence of the Chamber of Commerce and the loyal support accorded them by the people of this community which their untiring work is undoubtedly benefitting.

At present the organization is working overtime to secure aid on the roads leading into this town and also, on the road into Portland over which all loads must be hauled, and all traffic must pass. As this strip of road is now, it is almost prohibitive to traffic both pleasure and business.

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE

Interesting Items Gleaned From the Court Records.

The following marriage licenses were granted for the week ending Saturday: Lawrence G. Fosdic, legal age, and Mae S. Lovgren legal age. William J. Feldt, legal age and Pearl Woolridge, legal age.

In the estate of Chas. Knapp a petition for probate of will was filed.

J. H. Shearer is petitioning for the guardianship of Eva E. Thompson, declared to be insane and unable to care for her estate, which amounts to a probable \$2,000.

In the estate of F. H. Mury, L. B. Mury is petitioning for papers of administration. Property amounts to \$10,000.

In the estate of Joseph W. Marsh, David Walker Marsh is petitioning that letters testamentary be issued to Mary M. Marsh, executrix of the Marsh estate.

William Berger vs. F. F. Johnson, in which the plaintiff asks for judgment on mortgage for the sum of \$1200 with interest at 6 per cent. Mortgage drawn on certain mill property located in Forest Grove including machinery, and other equipment. Also costs of action.

Hillsboro Garden Tracts vs. McLain Cooper. Foreclosure on mortgage given on certain lots in said garden tracts located at Hillsboro.

James F. Williams vs. Carrie Williams—Divorce on the alleged grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. Plaintiff alleges that the defendant falsely accused him before his children of being immoral and leading a double life. Plaintiff also alleges that the defendant forced an elder son to leave home and that, finally, he also was compelled to leave home and live by himself.

The Encyclopedia Britannica Corp. vs. W. H. Hollis for money due on Encyclopedia. Alleged amount said to be \$220 to be paid in installments of \$5 per month until paid. Of this amount only \$5 had been received. Plaintiff asks judgment for \$120, costs of action and interest at 6 per cent per annum from date of delinquencies.

J. W. Deitz vs. Amelia Deitz for divorce plaintiff alleging cruel and inhuman treatment. Defendant in this case is alleged to have insulted the plaintiff and otherwise made life unbearable for him and at last to quiet the defendant, and upon her promise to desist from further harassing the plaintiff, she was given certain properties to the amount of \$15,000. Plaintiff complains that this was insufficient and that he was at last compelled to leave his home, the defendant thereafter refusing him the right to see or hold conversation with the children.

Riga Van Loh vs. William Van Loh. Divorce alleging cruel and inhuman treatment, non support and desertion. Plaintiff alleges that she was compelled to scrub, wash, pick up potatoes and do other menial and hard labor in order to provide for the family of five children.

Plaintiff asks custody of minor children.

E. C. Winters vs. L. N. Tompkins. Judgment on bill due for labor performed to the extent of \$60 with interest at 6 per cent since Nov. 4, 1914. Also costs for action.

Dr. J. O. Robb vs. Chas. Martin and Theo Martin, his wife. Suit brought for the recovery of \$200 alleged to be due plaintiff

for medical service rendered. Also costs and interest at six per cent from April 12, 1916.

When the registration books were closed and totaled it was found that 6153 republicans 1536 democrats and 647 miscellaneous were registered making a total of 8338.

Civil War Veteran is Buried at Beaverton.

The funeral of the late Albert W. Hart, civil war veteran, was held in the Methodist church here Monday afternoon. Deceased was 71 years of age at the time of his death, having been a resident of Oregon for the past 44 years, 25 years of which he spent in Drain. He was an engineer by trade, born in Cicero, N. Y., in 1845, and at the age of 18 enlisted in Company B, 185th regiment New York volunteers. He served under Sherman in the march to the sea, and took part in the battles of Antietam, Bull Run and Gettysburg. In the hard fighting he was not wounded once, but three days after peace was declared he was engaged in a skirmish beyond the zone of immediate communication and was shot in the leg which left him crippled. Despite this he has lived an active life doing the work of an average man on the farm. His death on Saturday was due to the effects of sunstroke received while serving in the army. He leaves a wife, daughter, two brothers and a sister.

Beaverton School Notes.
