A TAX LAW.
The new tax law passed by the last legislature is proving to be rather a joke. In a visit to the courthouse we were somewhat surprised to learn that according to a recent ruling of the state tax commission people are still allowed to pay the first half of their taxes without paying the full amount. The one per cent penalty applying only to the first half until October 5.

One might therefore delay paying all his taxes until the 5th of October and the penalty would only amount to six per cent interest whereas to hire the money would at present rates cost eight per cent. Usually, it has been customary for those who were compelled to borrow the money to pay their taxes with to hire the full amount and pay in full. For illustration if A's taxes were \$200 he would hire that amount until fall at 8 per cent whereas now under the law he might allow his taxes to go delinquent until fall. The penalty of one per cent per month for eight months would really only be four per cent on the whole amount. Therefore formerly he paid \$10.66 interest now it would cost him but \$8.00 in penalty. Or under the law he might let the full amount of taxes run until Nov. 5th and then pay in full and the penalty would be but eight per cent. It therefore looks as if the lawyers of the coming legislature would have to make another try at tax legislation or allow the state to go into competition with our banks in

the money loaning business with a consequent demoralization of all public revenue with its attending evils, for it is evident that many taxpayers another year will take advantage of this lax and unbusiness-like law.

THE CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF.

C. W. Stafford.

Charles W. Stafford, one of the first publishers of the McHenry County Journal, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. S. H. Davis at Beaverton, Oregon, Thursday, April 6th. He had not been in good health for the past two years, and while his death was not wholly unexpected by members of the family, still the news came as a shock to his many friends in the city. The remains were brought to Velva Monday by Mrs. Davis and funeral services were held from the Congregational church Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Taylor officiating, and interment made in the family lot in the city cemetery, where his first wife and son, Walter, are buried.

Charles Wilson Stafford was

born in Medina county, Ohio, March 3, 1841, the fourth son of Elhanan W. and Sylvia Stafford. He moved to Sangamon county, Illinois, with his parents when very young and grew to manhood there. In 1859 he crossed the plains to California, a few years after the rush of gold seekers to that country, and spent several years in the west with the pioneers of California, Idaho and Montana. He returned to the east in 1865, making the trip down the Missouri with a party of men in a flat boat from Helena, Montana, to Kansas City, Mo. During Mr. Stafford's last visit to Velva two years ago he was telling the writer about this trip and it was indeed very interesting. In those days the country from Helena to Yankton, S. D., was a wilderness and the party experienced many adventures. At about the point where Washburn now stands a herd of buffalo started swimming the river. There were hundreds in the herd and the boat had to be stopped for a considerable time. At night the party endeavored to reach one of the many islands in the river, out of reach of the Indians, many of whom were hostile.

Mr. Stafford was married to Eliza J. Crothers at Battle Creek, Mich., December 20, 1868. Four children were born to them, three of whom survive. C. C. Stafford of this city, F. H. Stafford, cashier of the First State Bank of McHenry, N. D., and Mrs. S. H. Davis of Beaverton, Oregon. His first wife died at Waubay, S. D., on January 23, 1893, and his son, Walter A. passed away in Velva, January, 1910.

Mr. Stafford was one of the pioneers of South Dakota, immigrating to that state from Battle Creek, Mich., in 1883. He first located at Edmore being engaged in the mercantile business. Later he was engaged in the hotel business at Ipsawitch and Andover. Mr. Stafford took an active part in the politics of the state and was a member of the first house of representatives of South Dakota, from Day county from 1889 to 1890. He was admitted to the bar in 1889 and practiced law for a time. He held the position of state oil inspector of South Dakota, from 1893 to 1897 and in 1893 Mr. Stafford turned his attention to newspaper work with his son, W. A. Stafford, when they established the Waubay Clipper. Later he established four other papers, one at Aberdeen, S. D., which he edited until coming to Velva in 1899.

In 1900 Mr. Stafford and his son started this paper, The McHenry County Journal, which they successfully edited until the death of W. A. Stafford in 1910, when the paper passed into the hands of the present owner. They also established the Sawyer Clipper and Max Enterprise.

In 1898 Mr. Stafford was appointed to a position in the house of representatives in Washington, D. C., which position he held until 1907. In September, 1908, he was united in marriage to Emma J. Hoine at Monticello, Ind., and moved to Portland, Oregon, where he made his home most of the time since, for a time being engaged in the real estate business. Mrs. Stafford is now at the home of her daughter in Washington, D. C., and is in poor health and was unable to be in attendance at the funeral. The deceased also leaves an older brother, D. W. Stafford at Waubay, S. D.

Mr. Stafford was closely identified with the early development of Velva and his kindly manner and honest dealings made for him a host of friends who will be saddened by the news of his death.

The Journal joins the many friends of the family in extending sympathy to the bereaved.—McHenry County Journal, Velva, N. D.
