TO THE VOTERS.
The voters are striving to re-
duce taxes. The idea of tax re-
duction will be uppermost in our
thoughts when we cast our votes for
the respective candidates at
the primaries the 19th of this
month. The question is how are
we going about it, to determine
the proper course to pursue. We
know this much, that taxes have
been too high in the past yet
those who have been in office for
years and are chiefly responsible
so far as county expenses are
concerned are asking you to per-
petuate their policies. We can
not prove the existence of a po-
litical ring at Hillsboro but we
do know that there is a circle of
politicians who have domineered
nominations in the past and who
are at this time engaged in a
desperate attempt to continue
their power. Is it reasonable to
expect any change in county
management so long as these
forces are at work controlling
the nominations. It is generally
talked that this circle is so
well grounded that it includes
even democrats who influence
members of their party to regis-
ter republicans in order to aid in
the nomination of selected can-
didates upon the republican
ticket. If this program keeps
up long in the future the repub-
lican party in the county will be
in disrepute. Republicans are
getting disgusted with that kind
of politics and begin to realize
that the party needs a cleaning up.
This condition is far reaching
in effect. It has resulted in the
neglect of the outlying districts

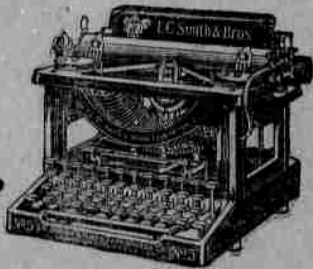
of the county. We notice it in
our worn out roads. We elect

How long Mr. Voter are we going
to permit this thing to continue?
Is it not time to take out a chunk
of that circle and stop the merry-
go-round.

Mr. citizen you must bear in
mind that the coming years will

Bagley for district attorney. The
people will make no mistake in
selecting him for that office. He
is an attorney of ability and will
be fully capable of doing justice
to that office and take care of the
work without a deputy, thus
saving the taxpayers the neat
sum of \$800 per year which now
goes to hire a deputy district at-
torney.
