Mardi Gras Will Close 1916 Event

Ualtee is the name given the
weird and spectacular procession
to close the tenth annual Rose
Festival at Portland June 9.
Ualtee is a Chinook name
meaning joy, gladness and festi-
vity, and has been little used
even by the Indians themselves.
From old legends it has been
learned that at certain times the
Red men held festivals which
were called "Ualtee", pronounced
"Waltee", when days were
given over to the celebration of
some successful battle, or a good
hunting and fishing season.

It has also been found that the
women wore a dress made from
the bark of the Cedar tree.
Leading the parade will be a de-
legation of Portland girls imper-
sonating the women of the early
Indian tribes who took part in
these festivals and costumes will
be made from bark to give an ex-
act reproduction of this ancient
festival.

Governor Withycombe has been
invited to be grand marshal of the
pageant with former governors,
the mayor of Portland, city and
county commissioners, heads of
police and fire bureaus and
United States government offi-
cials as aids.

The pageant will introduce many
comical, serious, unique and
spectacular features and will be
more than fifty blocks in length.
It will be more elaborate than
such carnival features as the New
Orleans Mardi Gras and similar
pageants of other cities of the
United States and foreign coun-
tries.

Oregon Outdoors

National Park and the Klamath
Country.

Portland and vicinity is very
thoroughly described and the
tourist is advised to make a long
stay in this beautiful city. The
Rose Festival is shown to be
Portland's great annual event.
The Columbia River Highway
occupies a very prominent po-
sition and a lengthy article is
devoted to it.

ODD LABOR SAVING DEVICE.

A Farmer's Ingenuity With a Clock
and a Flat Trap.

On a farm in western New York it is
frequently necessary to shut off a gaso-
line engine pump late at night. The
pump is located more than a mile from
the house, and the owner, after many
weary midnight trips, decided to dele-
gate the duty of shutting it off to a
trusted family alarm clock.

The clock was first securely fastened
to a support directly opposite and
about a foot away from the switch of
the engine. One end of a short piece
of cord was attached to the switch
and the other end tied firmly to the
winding post on the back of the clock,
which revolves as the alarm rings.
The clock was set at the desired hour,
but instead of ringing it wound up the
cord on the revolving post, pulled open
the switch and stopped the pump.

The arrangement worked perfectly
except when the switch became clog-
ged or jammed so that the mechanism
of the clock was not sufficiently strong
to pull it open. This difficulty was
remedied by bringing into play an old
fashioned spring rat trap. The pull
of the clock is now used to snap the
trap, and the strong throw of the trap
spring shuts off the current without
fail.

In another instance an alarm clock is
used to open the small sliding door of
a poultry house. In this case the clock
winds up a string connected with a bal-
anced weight. The pull of the string
causes the weight to fall from its sup-
port and as it falls it pulls up the slid-
ing door.—Country Gentleman.
