Association Meets

The Crescent Grove Cemetery Association was called to order May 30 at the cemetery by John Caldwell, chairman, and the report of Secretary Thomas Bradley was received and accepted. His report shows receipts for the past year to have been \$276.85 and expenditures \$182.25 with amount in hands of secretary and treasurer at beginning of year the report shows an amount on hand at this date of \$174.20.

The following directors were re-elected for another year: Thos. Bradley, John Caldwell, and C. Christensen. The subject of care of graves was discussed and the secretary promised that if the sum of \$5 was paid to the treasurer the association would spade up the lot or lots, seed to grass and keep mowed for one year. Another plan which would make the care perpetual would be to deposit the sum of \$100 with association and interest up on this at 6 per cent would be allowed, insuring care of the plot.
