## COURT REPORTS

### Interesting State Circuit Court in Court Records.

#### Church Court

**M. E. Franchise vs. F. V. ...** et al—Judgment on note for the sum of \$22.04 with interest at 8 per cent per annum from the first day of June, 1912, and ...

**Mabel H. Weston vs. E. E. ...**—Oregon, Defendant ... the defendant ... and was of a mean and nasty nature. Alleged that falling in several transactions defendant would blame plaintiff in the presence of friends. At times he would leave home for intervals of a week at a time and never would stay home nights, always absenting himself until he had time. Plaintiff alleges that defendant is possessed of a bad temper and that he would curse and swear at plaintiff for no provocation at all and in the presence of others. Plaintiff asks for a decree and her maiden name.

**Martin J. Vandehey vs. E. E. ...** et al—Judgment for the sum of \$50 with interest at 6 per cent from the fourth day of December, 1915. Plaintiff alleges that he sold defendant merchandise to that extent.

**Meta Townsend vs. Friedrich ...** et al—Divorce. Defendant alleged to have struck plaintiff with his fist and also with his open hand, once knocking her over a table. Plaintiff asks custody of minor child and \$3000 for her support and to educate the child with, also \$150 to enable plaintiff to support self during the course of the trial.

**Marie English vs. James ...** et al—Divorce on the grounds of desertion plaintiff alleges that defendant deserted her soon after marriage.

**N. M. Todd vs. E. M. ...** et al—Suit for the recovery of certain moneys loaned to defendant with interest and costs. Mortgage upon certain real property involved.

**Elizabeth Shute vs. John ...** et al. On February 10, 1932, the defendant in this case filed suit for a divorce in the courts of Washington county against the plaintiff. Plaintiff now claims that the defendant has since that time lived with and supported the plaintiff and led her to believe that the suit for divorce had not been granted. Lately examining the court records the plaintiff finds that her answer to the complaint filed by the defendant in 1932 was never filed and that she was divorced from the defendant at that time, the defendant having obtained a decree by false representations and default. The two lawyers employed in the case are now dead as is the judge who heard the case. The plaintiff in the present case now charges S. B. Hunton with failure to file the answer as he promised in the first divorce case. She now asks that the Courts decree of March 22, 1932, be set aside.

To J. L. Simpson, Nina M. Simpson and Francis J. Downey, three of the defendants above named:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause and court on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before July 13, 1934, and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof plaintiffs will apply to the court for a judgment against the defendants J. L. Simpson and Nina M. Simpson for the sum of \$1500.00 with interest at the rate of 7 per cent per annum since November 15, 1914, and the sum of \$180.00 attorney's fee and the further sum of \$27.22 with interest at 5 per cent since October 10, 1915, and the sum of \$34.50 with interest at 5 per cent since February 17, 1916, and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and for a decree, notwithstanding that certain mortgages given by the defendant J.
