Easter, D. Munford, J. A. Thornburgh; new industries, Senator Haines, Fred Groner, J. H. Garrett, B. K. Denney, W. J. Dodson. A special committee on program was also appointed whose duty to name a subject and so one member of the League to discuss it at the meeting. The first subject will in all probabilities be Rural Credits. The next meeting will be held some time in October and the next meeting of the executive committee will be held the first of August at Beaverton.

Burglar Caught at Tualatin.

Dutch Kirtz (real name unknown), paroled convict was taken up the other night at Tualatin where he had entered a store with the apparent intention of burglarizing the place. Later in the week he was taken to Hillsboro and lodged in the county jail. Kirtz will be remembered in Beaverton as the man who was caught in the J. L. Hardy confectionery about three years ago. He received a sentence of from one to fifteen years and was paroled. Since that time he has been making his home near the town of Tualatin. The arrest was made by Deputy Sheriff J. W. Andrews of that place.
