Beaverton Boy Writes Home.

James Emmons, son of mail carrier W. B. Emmons, writes a very interesting letter from the border where he is stationed with Battery A. We print the letter in part below.

Calexico, Cal., July 1, 1916.—Got here after a whole lot of hard traveling. We laid over in the Yuma desert for 6 hours. The track was covered with sand and the thermometer stood at 132. Sounds fishy, but it sure is true. We are 116 feet below sea level and the average degree 120. Rattle snakes and Gila monsters abound. There are acre after acre of watermelons and cantaloupes and there hasn't been any rain since August 5, 1915. Sounds great doesn't it? Lots of irrigation though. It is 2-3-4 miles to the Colorado river.

We are about five blocks from the Mexican line and soldiers of both armies patrol the border within ten feet of each other. We have 1200 men, 23 modern guns, 3 in. 7 in. and 8 in. guns. The Mexicans have no large guns, about 800 strong and seem very friendly; but of course no chances are taken. It is certain the poor devils don't want war, but are forced to it by the high-er-ups.

Mex-i-Cal across the line is the main port of Calexico and is owned by rich Mexicans. It sure is a wild town—everything that is bad. If an American crosses the line he is subject to immediate death; so there is no chance for any of the boys to go bad; for Calexico is tamer than Beaverton and a very Beautiful Tropical City. No saloons or pool halls.

Send me the old daily papers if it isn't too much trouble. A little thing like that would sure be a great help. All the boys do is lay around camp and curse the hot weather and wish they were back in Oregon.
