An exceptional crop of sweet corn is being raised on the acre of land inside the city limits by Frank Stuypt. Frank uses this in his business as a labor saving device. When a cistern grows and wishes to look at Oregon land and produce Frank takes them out back, shows them the crop, figures a little on an old envelope and produces the astonishing fact that he will harvest 3 tons of corn which will bring at the least 10 cents a pound. The result may easily be surmised by anyone who can multiply and subtract. Thus if 1 acre will produce this much 80 acres will bring in a nice income. This is nothing unusual for this part of the valley.
