Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)
MONMOUTH, Ore., Jan. 15.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week. Students numbered 178, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon. . . . how to care for large student body a problem. . . . 500 being crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 300. Galleries filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 100 students seated on platform. New heating houses completed, additional to existing houses built and used. One hundred girls sleep on upper floor of school.
The official school report gives 140 grade pupils in Monmouth, for teacher practice.

Read what those you have elected to handle the affairs of your state and who are thoroughly informed regarding school conditions in Oregon have to say concerning measure 308 on the ballot at the coming election:

- By James W. Wynn, Governor of Oregon: "Oregon is a state of the future. It is the only state in the Union that has a normal school. . . . It is the duty of the state to support the normal school at Pendleton."
- By J. A. Chubb, State Superintendent of Public Instruction: "I trust that the voters of the state will unite in passing the measure of a Normal School at Pendleton."
- By F. L. Campbell, President of the University of Oregon: "At least one additional Normal School is urgently needed in Oregon."
- By W. J. Kerr, President of the Oregon Agricultural College: "Since the people of Pendleton are initiating a measure for the establishment of a Normal School at that place, it will give me pleasure to support this measure."
- By J. M. Ackerman, President Oregon Normal School at Monmouth: "A careful analysis of the situation will convince you that Oregon needs a Normal School at Beaverton City and Pendleton. . . . It will give me pleasure to support this measure."
- By Mrs. Charles M. Giesner, President of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs: "I most heartily endorse the location of said Normal School at Pendleton."
- Prof. Robert G. French, Former President of the Normal School Located at Weston: "An immediate establishment of such a school at some central point such as Pendleton would prove a great asset to the State of Oregon."
- H. F. Mulloy, Ex-President Southern Oregon Normal School: "I cheerfully support the location of an Eastern Oregon Normal School at Pendleton."

State Board of Regents of Oregon Normal School declares that "the necessity for additional Normal school facilities in Oregon is apparent."
Portland Chamber of Commerce endorses measure 308 and say Pendleton most logical location for Normal school in Eastern Oregon.
