At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of Beaverton, held yesterday, the same officers were continued in their respective positions for another year and were extended a vote of thanks from the stockholders for their untiring efforts in behalf of the bank. The officers are: F. W. Livermore, president; B. K. Denny, vice president; Doy Gray, cashier, and Miss Lillian Evans, assistant cashier.

The stockholders also declared an 8 per cent. dividend and added \$1,000.00 to the surplus fund and left a substantial sum in the undivided profits account, undisputable evidence of the careful

management and successful business of the bank during the past year.

The auditing board, composed of J. A. Mott, S. K. Nelson, M. Welter and J. T. Williams, was also re-elected for the coming year and the Board of Directors was also unanimously re-elected for the ensuing twelve-month.

Contracts Let for Clearing Right-of-way for New Highway--Deeds Are All Secured

Contracts have been let for the clearing of the right-of-way for the new Pacific Highway on the north of the Southern Pacific tracks between Beaverton and Hillsboro and the deeds for the right-of-way over the new part of the highway have been signed and are now in the hands of County Judge D. B. Reasoner who will attend to recording them, thus perfecting the title of the county to this new road.

A final contract for a short bit of the highway was let to Martin Vandehy of Rock Creek yesterday, thus completing the clearing over the new road and removing the last preliminary necessary before actual road construction begins. Contracts had previously been let to M. E. Blanton for 6 1/2 acres from St. Mary's west to beyond Huber Park and to C. E. Roberts of Witch Hazel for two acres at Rock Creek. Mr. Vandehy is completing the stretch just this side of Rock Creek.

Judge D. B. Reasoner and J. F. Stroud were over the right-of-way yesterday and working in conjunction with other members of the committee, the deeds to the right-of-way were secured and placed in the hands of the Judge.

Starch Factory Installs Power [And Is] Ready to Receive All Potatoes Offered from Date

The starch factory turned on juice Wednesday and are now receiving potatoes in the bins. A big 80-horsepower boiler has been installed to supply steam for washing and cooking and the management expects to be making starch by the first of the month, or shortly after that.

All machines throughout the plant have been equipped for individual motors and modern conveniences and labor-saving devices characterize the equipment throughout.

Manager Griffith states that he is leaving nothing undone to help provide a market for farm products. Potatoes are the first

product to receive their attention and an effort is being made to care for the entire crop, for the manager of the factory fully realizes that their own success is dependent upon making it profitable for the farmer.

Tucker, member of Beaverton's hustling real estate firm, the editor had the privilege of visiting this hustling community and viewing some of its activities and industries. It was our good fortune on Monday to meet a few of these men and we do not wonder that Reedville is always ready with its quota, when called, whether that quota be work to be done, money to be raised, men for the army, or enthusiasm to be engendered.

A. G. Olinger, general merchant and live booster for his community, was getting ready to go to the city when we called and in spite of being in a hurry and asserting that he was feeling rather grouchy, gave us such

a cordial reception and proved so live a highway booster that we are going back again so we may meet him when he is feeling well and has a little spare time on his hands.

Mr. Olinger has a remarkably good general merchandise store, enjoys a good trade and brings to his customers the conveniences of the city at their country homes in a way that has won for him the support of some of the best farmers in the county. They all speak a good word for the Reedville merchant.

There are about 3000 cords of wood now on the sidings and the yards at Reedville, but owing to the difficulty and uncertainty of getting cars, the shipment of the wood this winter has not been so heavy as it was in the fall.

The warehouse of J. B. Imlay is well filled with grain and feed but the difficulty of getting in more shipments has worried him the same as it has other dealers in this county. Mr. Imlay has

found time, in spite of this uncertainty, to be one of the live workers for the highway and is always ready to do his part and more for the advancement of the community. He has sent to his customers one of the nicest calendars for 1918 that we have seen distributed this season.

L. R. Golt is the village blacksmith at Reedville. But he has a shop so well equipped that no one need ever pass his shop when looking for repair work.

A large and roomy shop is so well stocked with material and equipment that it is filled with revelations for everyone who is permitted to inspect it. Gasoline power has been introduced to drive numerous labor-saving machines. Gas lights turn night into day when the busy season is on or when emergency calls for repairs on short notice when night has fallen. Attached to the big line shaft which the gas-

Fifteen Thousand Men Are Needed at Once to Guard Uncle Sam's Public Utilities

There is work for all in the government service. No matter if you have passed the military draft age or have not yet arrived at the age when Uncle Sam will send you to fight against the Kaiser, if you are strong and capable, the nation has a place for you in the service. A bulletin recently posted in the recruiting stations of the country calls forcibly to our attention the urgent need for home service. A copy of this bulletin has been furnished us by Sergeant G. Keyser who has charge of the recruiting station at Second and

Burnside streets in Portland, assisted by Sergeant Baldwin of this city and Sergeant Donovan, two retired army officers who have seen long service and are still capable of outdoing many of the young fellows in getting the men into the right part of the service. The bulletin follows:

"Fifteen thousand men needed at once for United States Guard for protection of public utilities in United States. Enlistments for period of existing emergency. Men enlisted must be beyond draft age. Enlistment of married men authorized; Span-

ish American, Philippine, Boxer Campaign, Army, Navy or Marine corps, and men with experience in well organized fire and police departments. Where practicable, they will serve in the vicinity of their homes."

An average of 25 to 30 men per day come to the recruiting station with inquiries as to what they can do for the service of the nation. American patriotism is still as wonderful as it ever was.

In the enlistment for this U. S. guard service, if the enlisted man is a married man, he may
