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Notice to Taxpayers

Notice is hereby given that on Monday,
February 12, 1917, the tax rolls for the
year 1916 will be opened for the collec-
tion of taxes. The first half of all taxes
shall be paid on or before April 5th fol-
lowing, and the second half on or before
October 5th following. Interest shall be
charged and collected at the rate of 1 per
cent per month or a fraction of a month
until paid. "Interest at said rate applies
to the first half if not paid by April 5th,
and to the second half if not paid by
October 5th." All taxes remaining un-
paid on October 5th, shall become delin-
quent and on November 5th a penalty of
5 per cent will be charged and collected
thereon in addition to the interest pro-
vided herein. Any day after the expira-
tion of six months after the taxes charged
against real property are delinquent,
the sheriff shall have the right, and it
shall be his duty upon demand to make
out and issue certificates of delinquency
against such property. Certificates of
