Killing Moles and Gophers.

Traps for moles; and traps, poison or fumigation for gophers, is the way to get rid of these pests as recommended by the U. S. Biological Survey and the O. A. C. Zoology department. Campaigns for control of these rodents are now under way by these forces, assisted by the county agents in Tillamook and Lane counties. Hundreds of farmers are organizing and co-operating in the movement; this is essential to its success, because the rodents redistribute themselves if left in untreated areas. In addition to the value of cleaning up moles there is a profit from the sale of the skins at from 15 to 25 cents each.

Moles are trapped by plugging up their holes and setting the trap in the runway, where it is disguised by the dirt. Kind of trap taking off the skin, and preparing it for market, are explained in a new Extension Bulletin just off the press, copies of which may be had free of charge.

Poison baits for gophers are prepared by sprinkling carrots, parsnips or potatoes with powdered strychnine mixed with starch. These baits are prepared under the supervision of the county agent or other competent authority at large meetings of farmers on official "gopher day," and spread over large areas at the same time.

The open season on six-inch trout begins April 1st and sportsmen are urged to purchase their licenses and carry them on their person strict orders have been given deputies to check up all anglers found fishing in the streams.
