Warns Against Congealing Oils.

"It takes a motor 15 to 30 minutes to warm up properly after standing during cold weather," said F. H. Johnston of the Standard Oil Company, yesterday.

"With the oil in the crankcase too thick or sluggish from the cold to splash properly, what must be the effect on cylinders and bearings during the half-hour or so required for the oil to regain its proper fluidity? Excessive wear, with grave danger to serious damage to the motor, to say nothing of the drain on the batteries in trying to get started.

"To avoid this danger and annoyance, motorists should use a good oil refined from asphalt-base crude. Such oil has a natural zero cold test because there is no paraffin present to congeal at low temperatures. An oil from an asphalt-base crude flows freely down to zero."
