NEED BIG HERDSEurope's Meat Supply Must Come
From America.Warring Nations Have Depleted Live
Stock at Enormous Rate, Even
Killing Dairy Cattle For Food.American stock breeders are being
asked to conserve their flocks and
herds in order to meet Europe's tre-
mendous demands for meats during
the war and probably for many years
afterward.The United States food adminis-
tration reports that American stock
raisers have shown a disposition to
co-operate with the government in in-
creasing the nation's supply of live
stock.Germany today is probably better
supplied with live stock than any other
European nation. When the Ger-
man armies made their big advance
into France and then retreated vir-
tually all the cattle in the invaded
territory—approximately 1,500,000
head—were driven behind the German
lines.But in England—where 2,400,000
acres of pasture lands have been turned
into grain fields—the cattle herds
are decreasing rapidly. One of the
reasons apparently is the declining
maximum price scale adopted by the
English as follows: For September,
\$17.75 per 100 pounds; October, \$17.25;
November and December, \$16.08; Jan-
uary, \$14.40. The effect of these prices
was to drive beef animals on the mar-
ket as soon as possible.In France the number of cattle as
well as the quality have shown an
enormous decline during the war.
Where France had 14,807,000 head of
cattle in 1913, she now has only 12,
841,900, a decrease of 15.6 per cent.
And France is today producing only
one gallon of milk compared to two
and one-half gallons before the war.Denmark and Holland have been
forced to sacrifice dairy herds for beef
because of the lack of necessary feed.
Close study of the European meat
situation has convinced the Food Ad-
ministration that the future problem
of America lies largely in the produc-
tion of meat producing animals and
dairy products rather than in the pro-
duction of cereals for export when

on Monday, Feb. 18, 1918, the
tax rolls for the year 1917 will
be open for collection of taxes,
and the first half of all taxes
shall be paid on or before April
5 following, and the second half
on or before October 5 following.
Interest shall be charged and col-
lected at the rate of one per
cent per month or fraction of a
month in case of delinquency,
until paid. Interest at said rate
applies to the first half if not
paid by April 5, and to the sec-
ond half if not paid by October
5. All taxes remaining unpaid
on October 5 shall be delinquent
and on November 5, 1918, a pen-
alty of 5 per cent will be charged
and collected thereon in addition
to the interest herein provided.Any day after the expiration
of six months after the taxes
charged against any real prop-
erty are delinquent, the Sheriff
shall have the right, and it shall
be his duty upon demand to
make out and issue certificates of
delinquency against such prop-
erty, said certificates to be in-
terested at the rate of 12 per cent.
On or as soon as practicable af-
ter October 5, the tax collector
