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stances permitting private or public improvement to interfere with the successful prosecution of the war.

I favor the comprehensive improvement and construction of roads, particularly the main or trunk highways, which are of themselves military necessities, and I believe that during the war this work should be prosecuted only with the consent and approval of the National Government. I favor the construction of an adequate system of military highways for the defense of the Pacific Coast and I believe that the National Government should undertake such construction immediately upon the termination of the war, so that those resources, upon which the nation is so largely depending in prosecuting the war, will be properly conserved and protected and further as a means of affording employment for the hundreds of thousands of soldiers during the period of readjustment or until such time as the productive activities of peace will require their employment.

If nominated and elected:

I shall encourage and support such legislation as may be necessary for the establishment of nation-wide prohibition and the permanent adoption of equal suffrage in the state and nation.
