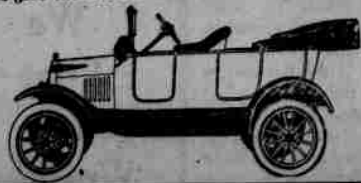

Last Friday night the game with Forest Grove was a most exciting one. The girls showed their skill at the game when they made 23 points to six for Forest Grove. Miss Weed and Miss Allen showed up exceptionally well in shooting baskets.
