MOLE PELTS GO HIGHER

Nineteen Hundred Pupils from
61 Schools Expressed Interest
at 26 Meetings Held in This
County by Theo. Scheffer.

The meetings for the mole
and gopher campaign have now
been completed and in all 26
meetings were held with an at-
tendance of about 1900 and 61
schools were represented. Mr.
Theo H. Scheffer of the U. S.
Biological Survey assisted in a
majority of the meetings and
explained the best methods of
trapping both moles and gophers
and also took up the matter of
poisoning gophers. Methods of
preparing mole pelts for market
were explained and he advised
not to "case" the pelts but to
dry them "open." Since Mr.
Scheffer has left mole pelts have
been raised and are now quoted
at least 15 cents higher than the
price previously given. Boys
and girls should, therefore, be
able to get more than 25 cents
per pelt. A plan of pooling the
skins was advised by Mr. Scheffer
as the companies prefer to
obtain pelts in large quantities.
It is, therefore, planned to have
these pelts collected from all
the schools and sent from the
county agent's office at a date
that will be decided upon later.

Drainage Demonstrations Held on F. Chalmers' Farm at Roy.

On the farm of Francis
Chalmers at Roy Prof. W. L.
Powers gave a demonstration on
the planning of drainage sys-
tems and methods of determin-
ing the depth for laying tile.
He also made preliminary plans
for the draining of the farms of
Wm. Robb and H. N. Shannon.
Much interest is being shown in
tile drainage work in this county
and if sufficient work can be
found it will be possible to get a
contracting company who will
dig the trenches with a machine
and thus conserve labor on the
farms and do equally as satis-
factory work. Farmers who are
interested in contracting their
work are asked to communicate
with the county agent.
