A CONSTRUCTIVE ROAD
POLICY IS GETTING
RESULTS FOR COUNTY

Judge Reasoner's Work is Putting
Road Business Through
On Economical Basis.

Judge D. B. Reasoner was in Beaverton last Friday on his return from Garden Home, where he has a crew at work cleaning up the County's road machinery and getting it ready for the season's work. The county grader has been at work there for three weeks and with the approach of good weather all the vast array of road working machinery will be put to work.

Judge Reasoner has certainly made a record in the road improvements that Washington County should consider with pride. When he entered upon his office five years ago, this county was in debt for its worthless roads and was paying interest on \$27,000 worth of road warrants. The first year the Judge took this up and the second year he began a campaign

of real road construction that is now beginning to show the wisdom of doing things well when they are done at all. The county now has a Caterpillar tractor with a grader and planer that is doing the work of 12 teams and doing it better than the teams could do it. This means that at a cost of only about \$16 to \$18 per day, the county, under the present plan, is getting done in a permanent manner what could have been done only indifferently under the old plan at a cost of \$100 per day or more.

Besides this outfit, the county has four trucks, 11 rock crusher outfits and 11 rollers, besides a number of private outfits which are doing excellent road work under the direction of the Judge and at small cost to the county.

With such excellent results to his credit and with the road work so well organized on a cash basis, the people of this county will do the wise thing and keep the judge at his good work for another term.
