CUT WORMS.

This seems to be an unusually good season for cutworms and their depredations have already been started. Probably one of the best methods for their control is the use of poisoned bran bait. Thoroughly mix 50 lb of bran, 2 lb Paris green and six finely chopped lemons. Stir to a stiff dough with low grade molasses diluted with enough water to mix well with the bran. Sprinkle sparingly in small lumps around base of plants and over entire field. Grass land is more liable to infection by cut worms and if intended for corn or other crops should be plowed the preceding summer to destroy the grass as a breeding place. The worms prefer the bran bait to the plants. Since they usually hide before they die, the dead ones are seldom, if ever, seen.

HARVEST HELP.

It is expected that there will be some labor shortage this season, but unless there is some definite knowledge as to how much there will be it is going to be difficult to make any definite plans for relief. It has been planned to get furloughs for some of the soldiers during harvest season, but it now appears that it is going to be necessary to show that a need exists for a large number before any can be obtained. For instance, it does not seem possible to get one man for some section, as it seems to be the feeling that this should be taken care of locally. But where there is a need for 25 or 50 for ten days or two weeks it is thought that arrangements can be made. If you expect to need harvest help, let us know in advance as it will be far easier to assist in supplying it than it will be to wait until the last moment.
