

ST. CECILIA'S PARISH SCHOOL CLOSSES

**Rev. J. E. Rubis visits the Parish
and is Present at the Closing
—Blessing of the Ser-
vice Flag.**

The school term of St. Cecilia's Parochial School for 1917-1918 closed on Friday forenoon June 21 with appropriate exercises.

The children were all well trained for the execution of the various parts.

"How the Story Grew" was well acted by the Senior girls, and "The Singing Lesson" by the Senior boys.

The picnic dinner was enacted by the Primary tots and elicited applause by the audience of parents and strangers present.

At the closing of the exercises, the graduating diploma was awarded Agnes Welsh, and the Service Flag with twelve stars was blessed after which Father Rubis, the visiting clergyman, gave a very instructive talk on the importance of Catholic School work. He dwelt emphatically upon the point that Catholic School work instills the principle of civic duty and teaches the principle of conscience worship of God. The cross and the flag being respectively the banners of religious and civic rights causes the respect due everyone to worship God according to the dictates of conscience.

So long as there is no involving of moral and personal rights, we are bound to respect the rights of our neighbors to worship according to conscience, the Creator who is our first and highest good.

The audience having thanked the reverend visitor for his well pointed and inspiring talk, the singing of The Star Spangled Banner closed the program.

The twelve stars in the Service Flag represent the young men gone into the service out of the Parish since the institution of the school, the families represented being Fitzpatrick, Leis, Schmitt, Hinchy, Donovan, and Classen.

Later on as more are being added to the list, the names and regimental service will be credited.

The War Savings Society now numbers 24, and the Junior Red Cross Association 48.

During the summer months the W. S. Association will meet on the first Fridays of July, August and September.

The school flag was hoisted last Thursday June 20, when the Senior boys erected a forty-foot pole for the purpose on the southeast corner of the school lot.

The boys will keep up the War Garden during the summer and fall.

Queen Victoria once said to Ambassador Choate, "Do the Americans really believe that thirteen is an unlucky number?" He answered "No, your majesty, we do not, for the eternal foundations of our republic were built upon the number thirteen."

Christopher Columbus discovered us upon the thirteenth day of the month. There were thirteen colonies, and the first official flag had thirteen stars and thirteen stripes. Our emblem of sovereignty, the American eagle, takes thirteen letters to spell it. The same is true of the motto of our seal, "E Pluribus Unum," and also the great seal of the United States, "Annuit Coeptis."

There are thirteen stars above the head of the eagle; the olive branch has thirteen leaves. We have had many wars, but we count the Revolutionary most

important. "Revolutionary" is spelled with thirteen letters.

The name John Paul Jones contains thirteen letters, and he had thirteen vessels in the navy and carried the flag to victory when it was saluted on the thirteenth day of the month by a foreign power. Woodrow Wilson has the honor of coming under the lucky thirteen both as to the number of letters in his name and the year of his inaugural.

CURING HAY WITHOUT STACKING IS WASTEFUL

**Stacked Hay Is In Demand By
Feeders—Tops Market
When Sold.**

This is a good year for stacking hay. The practice of cutting hay, raking it, and curing it in cocks where it is left until it is baled saves some labor, but is an expensive and wasteful process from the standpoint of forage.

"Much hay is spoiled annually by bleaching and by wetting," says G. R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops in the Oregon Agricultural College. "Most of the loss in quality and shrinkage may be saved by stacking the hay. Less labor at baling time is required, and the hay is more uniform. In addition to this, the excessive drying out and brittleness may be avoided, giving—

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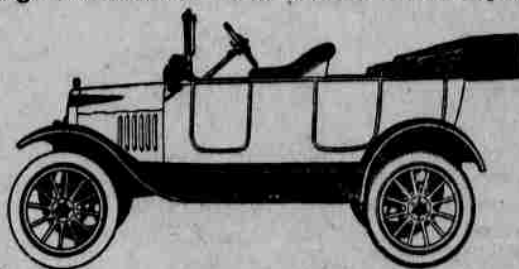
