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FOOD RESERVE WILL GUARD AGAINST WANT

A new food administration plan, in the carrying out of which every American family will be urged to participate, was discussed and definitely outlined upon instructions from Herbert C. Hoover at last week's zone conference in San Francisco. Federal Food Administrator W. B. Ayer, who attended the conference, said that his plan, which is for the building up of a great national food reserve, was the most important matter before the conference.

"The season of bountiful supply is the proper time for making provision against less fortunate conditions in the future," said Mr. Ayer, "and with the coming of the new harvest the Food Administration plans to begin building up a great reserve which will be a safeguard against future shortages or misfortunes. The most important item in this reserve will be wheat, which is literally the staff of life to the whole world just now. The conservation of wheat must inevitably be one of the first duties of the civilian for the duration of the war. This is because the wheat fields of the United States must provide the main supply of the armies at the front and for the Allied peoples behind the fighting lines, as well as for our own people here at home, so long as the war lasts. In order to meet this demand the United States must begin, with the new harvest, to store up a huge surplus against which it may draw to meet the needs that arise and in emergency. This will mean that the people of the United States are not to return to white breads and unlimited consumption of wheat as soon as the new crops are in, but that they must continue to conserve wheat flour. The conservation regulations will, of course, be modified when the new supplies are available, but our conservation efforts must not be relaxed. Our Allies across the seas are looking to us for the major part of their wheat supply, and we must not fail them. We must keep wheat and other important foods moving towards the front in a steady, unflinching stream. Our wheat harvest this year promises to be an abundant one, but no one knows what next year's harvest may be, and there are possibilities, too, of other misfortunes and disasters and our best safeguards against the shortages of the future is to fill our granaries and storehouses in advance. Every American family should keep the importance of this great national food

reserve in mind at all times, and not only waste nothing, but use their best efforts to aid the Food Administration. This is patriotic duty in which every man, woman and child of the nation may give valiant service."

Yankee Farmers, are You in Line?

In spite of scarcity of implements and shortage of farm labor, England, Scotland and Wales have all increased their acreage of wheat this year.

Fuel, coal particularly, that now looks to Oregon and Washington for markets will undoubtedly be diverted east in an effort to overcome to a degree the estimated national 85,000,000 ton deficiency.

This is the opinion of Fuel Administrator Holmes of Oregon based on information from Washington and his knowledge of local conditions.

The recent visit of national fuel administration officials to the Pacific Northwest presages the enforcement of a "fuel ration" order. This is indicated by the fact that Holmes already is making a survey of the state to ascertain the needs of the various districts. In this regard Holmes states that he plans to allow householders to order fuel, both wood and coal, in unlimited quantities just so long as possible. When necessity demands, however, he will curtail supplies, holding that national needs are superior to those of individuals or of industry not essential to winning the war.

Acting on instructions issued by National Fuel Administrator Garfield, Fred J. Holmes, fuel administrator for Oregon has notified all coal dealers that they cannot add the extra freight charges, effective June 25, to their retail prices unless they have actually paid the charge themselves. In other words Uncle Sam is determined that the new freight rate elevation shall not be made the excuse for profiteering. Violators of the order will be punished.

One or two water-dogs placed in a water trough at the beginning of the mosquito breeding season would be sufficient to eliminate the breeding of mosquitoes in them. Watering troughs are often the chief source of mosquitoes in farm houses and barns.

Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has just sent out a tabulation of the vote of the late primary election so far as it concerned state and district officers. It is put up in convenient form and will be a handy reference in any office having need of the figures it contains.

The Western Newt, or Water-Dog, a Natural Enemy of Mosquitoes, is the title of a pamphlet by Asa C. Chandler just received from O. A. C. It is the result of experiments which have convinced the investigators that the water dog in sufficient numbers will rid a pool of mosquito larvae.

chases just as few and far between as possible. Because of a lack of ships and recent submarine sinkings, sugar is coming into this country slowly, and it must be distributed accordingly if the general supply is to hold out and meet the needs of all housewives for their canning and preserving. That is why you cannot secure your whole season's canning supply of sugar at one time.

It isn't whether you can afford to waste that teaspoonful of sugar every morning, but rather whether your country can afford to have you do it. One teaspoonful multiplied by something less than 100,000,000 (our population), multiplied by 365 (days in the year) means something in helping to win this war. Watch your sugar spoon.
