THE SOULS OF CORPORATIONS.

There is an old axiom of English law that corporations have no souls. The manner in which thousands of corporations have given their services and their means to the Liberty Loan, to the Red Cross, and to the Y. M. C. A., and to other national efforts during this war seems to disprove the truth of the saying.

The Congress of the United States seems to have adopted the view that a corporation may have a soul, since it has authorized national banks to contribute to the American National Red Cross out of an net profits available under the law for the declaration of dividends. The law further provides that funds so contributed shall be used by the Red Cross in furnishing voluntary aid to the sick and wounded of the combatant armies, the voluntary relief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and the relief of the suffering caused by the war to the people of the United States and their allied nations.
