CARE SHOULD BE USED TO KEEP MILK SWEET

Milk Before Feeding to Avoid
Dust—Wash Hands and Use
Clean, Sanitary Pail,
Says O. A. C.

To keep milk sweet it must be kept clean and cold. Bacteria in milk are dangerous. The remedy is to keep them out by milking a clean cow, with clean dry hands, into a clean pail, followed by immediate and thorough cooling. To do this it is not necessary to go to much expense for practically all farmers have a supply of fresh cold water.

"One must take into consideration that contamination takes place every time the milk is handled, such as pouring from one vessel to another," says V. D. Chappell, assistant professor of dairy husbandry in O. A. C. "Milking should be done before feeding so that the air will be free from dust. The flanks and udder of the cow should be wiped with a clean damp cloth to prevent dirt, manure, and hair from dropping into the bucket while milking. This may seem to require a lot of work and to be impractical, but it brings results.

"Immediately after milking, the milk should be run through a clean strainer. A dirty strainer is the cause of much sour cream. The strainer no matter whether metal or cloth should be thoroughly cleaned after every milking.

A cloth strainer should be washed, and then placed in boiling water before being hung up to dry. After straining and while the milk is still warm, it should be run through a clean separator. The dirty separator is no doubt the cause of more sour cream than any other process through which the milk passes.

"Many farmers think that washing the separator once a day is sufficient so after separating the evening's milk, the dirty separator is left to stand over night until after the morning's milk has been separated, then washed. The warm milk in passing through the separator is subjected to centrifugal force causing the heavier particles to pass to the outside. Casein, dirt, and hair, gather on the bowl and form what is known as separator slime. This mass is a perfect medium for the growth of bacteria and to allow this to stand over night and use in the morning would be nearly as bad as straining the milk through a manure covered strainer."

MARKET REPORT.

The stock market at the North Portland Stock Yards opened for the week in a very firm and satisfactory condition, prices were well maintained throughout the day in all divisions. The offerings of cattle run largely fair to

medium, however, prices are holding firm. Prime steers \$11.75-12.25; good to choice steers \$10.75-11.75; medium to good steers \$9.50-10.75; fair to medium steers \$8.50-9.50; common to fair steers \$5.50-8.50; choice cows and heifers \$8.00-8.50; medium to good cows and heifers \$6.00-7.50; fair to medium cows and heifers \$5.00-6.00; canners \$3.00-5.00; bulls \$5.50-7.50; calves \$8.50-11.50; stockers and feeders \$6.00-8.00.

There is a large decrease in the run of pigs which would indicate the farmers are holding them with the intention of finishing them for pork. Quotations are: Prime mixed \$17.85-18.00; medium mixed \$17.65-17.85; rough heavies \$16.15-16.35; pigs \$15.75-16.25; bulk \$17.75-17.85.

The sheep market is showing considerable activity and clearances are complete, quotations are: East of the mountains lambs \$13.75-14.25; valley lambs \$13.50-14.00; yearlings \$9.50-10.25; wethers \$8.50-9.50; ewes \$6.00-8.00.
