Letters from The Boys Who Have Gone to Make the World Safe for Democracy

Extracts of letter received August 26 by Mrs. W. D. Jackson from her husband Lieut. W. D. Jackson:

Lieut. Jackson writes he was shell shocked and is now in a hospital Somewhere in France. That the past two months have been very hard ones.

How do you all like the way we have been handling the Dutch for the past few weeks? If we keep it up a short time we shall all be home for the long rest soon. I have seen the Yankee boys in action, real live action and I know Fritz does not like our way of fighting. One prisoner who was brought in wounded said, "If all the Americans fight like these, we will not last long." When they start after the Boche they don't fool around but go right out and get him and Mr. Boche knows it and is afraid of the Yanks.

This is an open season on Germans and as you probably know the boys from the states are trying their darndest to keep up with the running Germans. I suppose the folks at home feel pretty good about the ability of the American army.

I am sending you a little poem which I took from a paper. I thought it was good and it is at least quite true:

THE LITTLE HOME PAPER.
