

# GET READY FOR FIFTH LIBERTY LOAN IN APRIL

## Victory Loan Is Title Given To Bonds Which Will Rehabilitate Wounded Men.

The Fifth Liberty Loan will be known as the Victory Loan. Not only have we won a victory, but we have assumed an obligation the like of which no former victor in war was called upon to assume. It is more than jubilation over the fall of the foe. Heretofore when the war was won the victor has taken a part of the spoils of war, the vanquished foe has arranged for indemnity and the world has wagged on much as before. The soldier laid aside his sword and coming home to the plow, took up his old pursuits in much the same manner as before he went away.

But this has been a war to end war. It has been a war to the death and many of the nations that entered it are now no more. Two notable examples are Germany and Russia. No more shall Russia stand as the embodiment of arbitrary power as once she stood. Broken and starving in the clutches of anarchy, this once strong nation is a pitiable

spectacle indeed. Germany, the vanquished, it but little better. Stripped of her power, Prussia no longer is respected by the vassal states over which she once held the leash. And without her guiding and controlling leadership, the once marvelous efficiency of the German states is no more and the German nation is but a memory.

All of Europe faces hunger and if we are not to lose the fruits of the victory so dearly bought, we must accept the responsibility that has been thus thrust upon us and save the hungry hordes of wartorn Europe from the wolf of starvation.

President Wilson and his advisers are now in Europe seeking to safeguard the fruits of victory which our fighters have so gallantly and so dearly bought. If they are to succeed, there can be no relaxation at home. We must be ready for the Fifth Liberty Loan—the Victory Loan—which is to fulfill the pledges to be made at the peace table and to carry out the work which will be assumed there and the word must go forth to Europe that we are ready.

Our boys are coming home. Some of them are wounded;

some are sick; all of them are tired of war and ready to take up the pursuits of peace. They have been out of touch with the pursuits of peace for a season and they must be encouraged and helped back into the life from which they went and that life must be bettered and enlarged because of what they have gone through. The man who left with two strong arms and who comes home with one must not be made to pay a lifelong penalty of sacrifice and want because of his bravery. He must be made to feel that the nation for which he risked his all and gave so much is ready to repay the debt by making his broken body worth as much to him for future comforts as was the perfect man he offered on the altar of sacrifice. The man who comes home sick must be made to feel that those who stayed at home are ready to see that he is cared for and put in the best of care that his health may be restored if medical science can find a way and if not that his suffering may be made as light as possible.

So a large part of the proceeds of the Victory Loan will go toward the rehabilitation of our wounded men. Every soldier and sailor who has been broken by this war will be given every possible opportunity to regain his health and be restored to a self-supporting activity.

When medicine and surgery have done all they can for him, he will be considered by the Federal Board for Vocational Education. If his disability prevents his return to the vocation which he left at the call to arms, a wide choice of occupation is open to him.

If the injured man needs an artificial limb, the government in whose service he sacrificed a perfect limb is by duty bound to supply him with the best available substitute. Until his special treatment or training ends, he will receive regular compensation and his family will receive regular allotments. The war risk insurance will be paid until the end of vocational training if the course is elected without necessity, but in this case the allotments will not be paid to the family.

Instead of cringing, dependent cripples and beggars made so by an unappreciative country, they will be highly trained heroes whose sacrifices will not be tarnished by lack of appreciation. If you are worthy of victory, prepare now to buy Victory Bonds.

Two members of John Rowe's family are reported seriously ill.

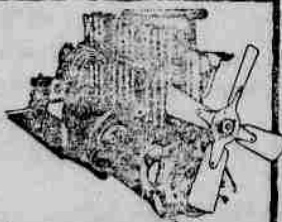

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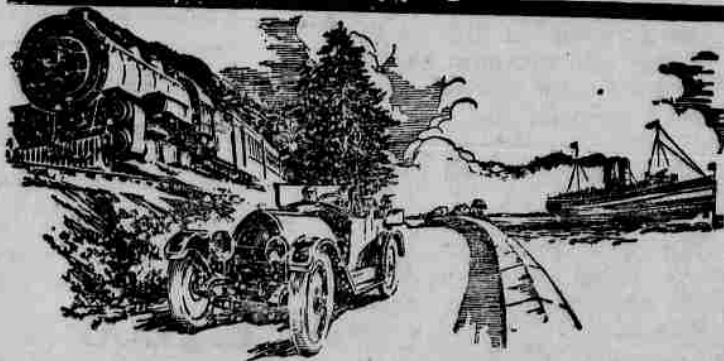
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
