OREGON POULTRYMAN**HEADS C. H. LILLY CO.**

C. F. Williams of Salem, Formerly Editor of Northwest Poultry Journal, Enters New Business Field.

C. F. Williams, for 11 years editor and manager of the Northwest Poultry Journal of Salem, has resigned and accepted the management of the Poultry and Stock Food department of the Charles H. Lilly Co., seed merchants, of Portland and Seattle. The territory which he will serve is that portion of the nation west of the Rockies, the Hawaiian Islands, Australia and the Orient. It is the oldest firm of the kind in the West, having been established in 1885.

Mr. Williams is well known to the poultrymen of the state, having been connected with the farm and poultry interests of the Northwest for 14 years and he estimates that he has travelled upwards of 50,000 miles by auto, boat and train, visiting fairs, poultry farms and exhibitions in Pacific Slope states.

Mr. Williams is a thorough poultryman, understanding all phases of the business, both from a theoretical and a practical standpoint. He is the present president of the Oregon Poultry Breeders' Association, and it was largely through his efforts that 16,000 hatching eggs were donated by patriotic poultrymen and distributed free to those who would agree to hatch and raise the chicks to maturity and thus aid the meat supply for 1918.

Poultrymen of the Northwest will appreciate having at the head of this progressive firm, a man with such practical experience as a poultryman. Poultry food is an important item to the industry and many of the so-called balanced rations now on the market are prepared and put out by inexperienced men.
