Mrs. Louise Cyrene Peterson, wife of John Peterson, of Whitford died Sunday morning as the result of a paralytic attack. The funeral was held at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon and interment was at Crescent Grove cemetery.

She leaves beside her husband, four brothers, B. K., A. V., Lewis Denney, of Beaverton and F. J. Denney, of Jefferson; one sister, Mrs. R. B. Brown, of Garden Home; four daughters, Vernie, (Mrs. Grover White,) of Gaston, Birdie, (Mrs. I. G. McCormick,) of Laurel, and Misses Ivy and Jessie Peterson, of Whitford; and four grand-children.

Louise Cyrene Denney was born on the old Thomas H. Denney donation land claim, January 13, 1853. She was married to John Peterson, on December 29, 1881 and to them were born four daughters. With the exception of nearly 18 years spent at Forest Grove three years after her marriage, she has lived the whole of her life on the farm where she was born.

She was a member of the Christian church at Forest Grove. Her last appearance in public was at the annual picnic, of the McKay school alumni, of which she was a member.

She was a daughter of Thomas H. and Berella I. Denney, and was herself one of Oregon's pioneer daughters.
