SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET

To the Clerk of School District No. 48, Washington County, Oregon:

Following is a statement of the estimated amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 16th, 1919, and ending on June 30, 1920. This budget is made in compliance with Section 217 of the School Laws of 1917, and includes the estimated amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax and all other moneys of the district:

NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELECTION TO INCREASE TAX MORE THAN SIX PER CENT OVER THAT OF THE PREVIOUS YEAR

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 48 of Washington County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said District at High School on the 26th day of November, 1919, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levy in said District for the year 1920, by more than six per cent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding.

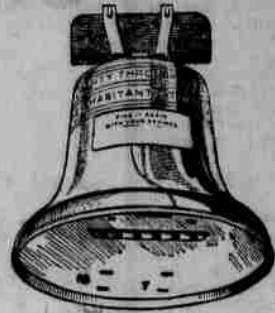
