BEAVERTON MEN HAVE VERY NARROW ESCAPE

C. VanKlee, Walter Workman and Herman Matzenline Drive Car off Terwilliger Boulevard in Fog

Because the thick fog which hung over the valley so confused the road with empty air that he could not see the turn, C. VanKlee of Beaverton drove the Ford in which he and Walter Workman and Herman Matzenline were returning from Odd Fellows' lodge in Portland, off the embankment on Terwilliger Boulevard, Monday night and rolled to the bottom of the ravine 150 feet below. The machine was completely wrecked and two of the men were sent to the hospital. VanKlee suffered a fractured rib, Workman was badly bruised and Matzenline escaped almost unharmed. After hasty treatment at the emergency hospital, VanKlee and Workman were sent to St. Vincent's hospital and Matzenline continued the journey home. Workman suffered a contusion of the scalp but not a fractured skull, as reported by the Portland papers.

Mr. VanKlee is out of the hospital and at the home of a friend. He can walk with aid but cannot get up alone and is unable to come home this (Thursday) evening.

BEAVERTON COW WINS WORLD RECORD FIRST YEAR

Young Jersey Production Milk and Wins First in Cattle World by Her Phenomenal Feat

Sunday's Oregonian under a New York date line has the following: Lulu Alpha of Aahburn, a young Jersey cow owned by J. J. Van Klee & Sons, of Beaverton, Or., has broken the world's butterfat record for all breeds of dairy cattle in the senior yearling class. According to announcement just issued by the American Jersey Cattle Club, this phenomenal cow produced 550.05 pounds of butterfat on a 365 day test, which was commenced when she was only 33 months old and which ended November 30.

This record not only breaks the present Jersey senior yearling figure of 548.33 pounds of butterfat, held by Silver Chimes Gwendolyn, in the Doerfler herd at Silverton, Or., but it raises the record of all breeds and brands Lulu Alpha of Aahburn as the greatest young cow of the dairy world.

Lulu Alpha of Aahburn was bred by J. M. Dickson & Son, of Shedd, Or., and at the age of 9 months was sold to J. J. Van Klee & Sons for \$150. She was sired by St. Mawes of Aahburn, a bull from the famous Cary herd, and is out of Wilda of Aahburn second, a line-bred representative of the Golden Glow's Chief family. She, therefore, combines the blood of St. Mawes and Golden Glow's Chief—the two outstanding bulls of the Jersey breed in Oregon. Those who have seen Lulu Alpha of Aahburn believe that she will eventually break the Jersey record for all ages now held by the famous Oregon cow, Vive La France.

During her recent test the new senior yearling champion was milked, fed and cared for by W. A. Van Klee, who proved himself to be one of the best feeders and hardmen on record. He milked the heifer three times a day, with no holidays or vacations. The test was carried on under the supervision of the Oregon Agricultural college, and frequent tests were made by representatives of the University of California, University of Idaho and Washington State College. The amount of milk produced was 13,068.7 pounds, which averaged 5.85 per cent butterfat.

Potato Improvement Sought
Oregon potato growers will be asked to co-operate with the state college experiment station in potato seed treatment and potato spraying next year to improve the yield and quality of the crop. The methods that have raised Wisconsin to the first rank in the production of high grade potatoes are being investigated by M. B. McKay, associate plant pathologist of the station, who will adapt them to Oregon conditions. He attended the Wisconsin potato show December 10 and inspected the potato work of the Wisconsin station. He will attend the conference of the potato pathologists of America, reporting the important work he has done on verisillium with in Oregon. He will arrange with the committee on experimental co-operative work for carrying on the line of work in 1920.
