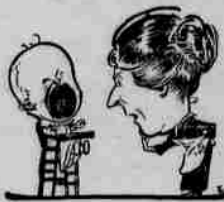

GIRL IS KILLED IN MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

Young Man Piloting Machine Buffers Broken Leg—Party on Way to Portland.

Miss Vanarda Bertha Garman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Garman, of this city, was accidentally killed on the Pacific Highway between Forest Grove and Cornelius on Monday morning of this week while enroute to Portland on a motor cycle piloted by Listine Barber. The accident happened when the rear tire of the motorcycle blew out, throwing the young people violently to the hard surfaced pavement, the young woman lighting on her head, from the effects of which her skull was crushed and the young man suffered a broken leg.

The accident took place just this side of Cornelius, and it is said the machine was going at a rapid rate of speed as the girl was thrown some distance and slid along the pavement for several feet after she struck the road.

Medical assistance was at once summoned but she was rendered unconscious and died before the surgeon arrived.

The young woman has been keeping company with Roy Wilson, and while there are all kinds of rumors to the effect that the young couple were eloping, intending to go from here to Vancouver and get married, this is emphatically denied, it being said that the young girl, who is only sixteen, was merely going to Portland for the ride. The party left Forest Grove a short while before, enroute to Portland and was made up of Charles Cady, Roy Wilson, Listine Barber, who now lives in Tillamook, and the victim of the accident.

It seems that Roy Wilson's machine carried no tandem and at his request young Barber, who was then on his way to Tillamook, consented to take the girl on his wheel as far as he was going, and at the time of the accident young Wilson and Charles Cady were in advance of the Barber boy and girl.

The parents of the young lady supposed that she was in school and the first inkling they had that she was not there came when the news was sent to them that she was seriously hurt. Then it was learned that she had played truant to make the trip to Portland, it being stated that the young couple expected to return home that night.

While at the Cady & Whited motorcycle shop before starting to Portland the boys stated to Charles Cady that they were going to Portland, and he told them that he was also going in. They asked him to go with them but he said that he had some work to do before going, and they insisted that they would wait for him, which they did and all three started together and on the way out of the city young Barber picked up the Garman girl who was waiting on the street.

The parents are heartbroken over the sad affair and will have the sympathy of the entire community.

Mr. and Mrs. Garman recently came to Forest Grove, their former home being in Nebraska.

Vanarda Bertha Garman, daughter of Harry C. and Anna Garman was born December 2, 1903, at Dodge, Nebraska. She came with her parents to Oregon in May 1919. Her age was 16 years, 1 month and 17 days.

The funeral occurred this afternoon from the Methodist church.

PICTURE SHOW AT GROVE MAY OPEN ON SUNDAY

At the adjourned meeting of the City Council held on Friday night of last week the ordinance concerning the opening of picture shows in Forest Grove on Sunday again came into the limelight and occupied much of the attention of the council during the evening, an entirely new ordinance eventually passing, which, if permitted to go into effect, will allow picture shows to operate on Sunday.

It will be remembered that a few weeks ago the city fathers passed an ordinance which would allow picture shows to operate on Sunday, but a referendum petition carrying something like 400 names, was filed with the City Recorder and Secretary of State asking that the ordinance be referred to the people at the coming November election. This action was fostered by the Brotherhood, an organization of men of the various churches of the city, represented by Attorney L. M. Graham. This action by the Brotherhood naturally held the picture show ordinance in abeyance until after the matter was voted on by the people and at that time decided for or against the ordinance. In presenting the new ordinance Friday night the members of the council claimed as they were the law making body of the city they had a right to pass any ordinance they desired, notwithstanding the fact that the old ordinance was being referred to the people and the new one contained practically the same legislation.

W. J. McCready, Rev. W. Walter Blair and Prof. Edward Taylor addressed the council in opposition to the passage of the ordinance, claiming that in passing this ordinance the council was playing unfair in not giving the people an opportunity to settle the question by ballot. In defense the members in favor of the ordinance stated that they were passing the ordinance for the best interests of the city, that it carried a license fee of \$50 per year, while the old ordinance required only \$12

per year license and that the city needed the extra revenue.

The new ordinance was supported by Anderson, Hines, Schultz and Shearer, Hoffman voting against its passage. Councilman Todd was absent.

The ordinance was passed without the emergency clause and will go into effect in thirty days if the mayor signs the ordinance. He has not yet signed it.
