At the local contest, Misses Alpha Williams and Della Allen put up a good argument but lost the votes of President R. F. Clark of Pacific University, Prof. Zenas A. Olson of the Hillsboro high school and Prof. Getz of Jefferson High School, Portland, who were the judges of the contest.

The Tillamook debaters were Clara M. Small and Harry C. Elliott, both seniors of the Tillamook high school.

The local negative team, composed of Miss Edna Hocken and Elmer Erickson, should have met the Banks affirmative team at Banks, but that contest was postponed because of the illness of one of the Banks debaters.

Forest Grove met Corvallis at both Forest Grove and Corvallis and lost both contests in their entirety to the Benton County debaters.

Banks negative team went to Tillamook and secured a lone point, the only consolation the Washington County debaters have.

INFLUENZA CLAIMS THREE

Boyd K. Long and Wife and Child
Pass Away Within 24 Hours

Boyd K. Long, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Long of Hillsboro, died Saturday in Portland of influenza, the death of his wife and infant child having taken place the previous day. Deceased was a trainman employed by the Southern Pacific and became sick with the disease only a few days before his death. His wife almost immediately afterward developed the disease and although removed to a hospital at once and every care given died the day before her husband passed away. Mrs. L. A. Long also became a victim of the contagion after going to the bedside of her son and is now in a Portland sanitarium, where her condition is reported to be satisfactory. The funeral of father, wife and infant was held in Portland Monday under the auspices of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, with incineration in the Portland crematorium. Boyd K. Long was born March 11, 1892, at Willapa, Wash., but spent his boyhood in Hillsboro. Before reaching his majority he enlisted in the regular army and served three years. Six years ago he was married to Gladys McDonald at Pomeroy, Wash., and for the past two years they have made their home in Portland. Surviving immediate relatives are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Long; two brothers, Donald E. and Clifford L. Long, and two sisters, Mrs. Gail W. Wells and Margaret Long.—Hillsboro Independent.

There were three fatalities due to accidents in Oregon during the week ending February 12, according to a report prepared by the industrial accident commission. The victims were: John O. Foster, logger, Coquille; Henry Sylvia, logger, Sequim, Wash. and Fred Withrow, sawyer, Linnet.

The secretary of the interior has rejected the appeal of Dr. J. F. Roddy of Medford, which was taken from a decision of the war mineral relief commission awarding Dr. Roddy approximately \$65,000 for his efforts to supply the government with chrome from a Blakely county, California, property, during the war.

SCHOOLS CLOSED THAT FLU MAY BE PUT UNDER CONTROL

TEN DAYS' VACATION GIVEN
TO PERMIT ISOLATION OF
CASES AND PUT TOWN IN
SAFER CONDITION.

After more than a week of attempts to control the local health situation by other measures, the authorities on Wednesday decided to close the schools for a short time of ten days in order that the situation may be put under control, the cases now raging isolated and new cases closely watched to prevent the spread of the flu.

On Thursday the St. Cecilia's Catholic school was closed for a like purpose.

Attempts are being made to enforce a rigid quarantine and it is hoped to have the situation under control by a week from Monday.

Be Carried Out as Announced.

In spite of the scare resulting from the flu, scarlet fever and other diseases prevalent in the community, the attendance at the showing of the film, "One More American," in which George Behan was starred, was a very good one and the picture was well received.

Owing to the prevalence of flu, the showing of Douglas Fairbanks in "Bound in Morocco," will not be given at the high school auditorium on Tuesday night, but instead the film will be booked for a later date.

The Beaver Portland Cement plant at Gold Hill, under the superintendence of W. H. Green, is now ready to operate. Repairs have been completed and the plant cleaned up ready for a steady run of 1000 barrels per day. The plant represents an expenditure of nearly \$100,000.

Starting values in platinum ore sent from Curry county has brought into the section around Langdale representatives of San Francisco mining concerns who are offering as high as \$5000 for individual claims located by various residents since the discovery was made a couple of months ago.

It is reported that a number of Portland people interested in the future of the state industrial school for girls will present a bill at the next session of the legislature asking for an appropriation for the erection and furnishing of a new building at that institution. The proposed building will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000, according to those interested in the bill.

With the view to working out a plan whereby cattle rustling on the ranges of Central Oregon can be stopped, livestock men of Central Oregon met in Bend with Supervisor N. G. Jacobson, of the Deschutes National forest, to formulate a range policy for the coming year. It is conservatively estimated by livestock men that no less than 100 head of beef cattle have either been killed or stolen by cattle thieves in the last year.

For the purpose of determining the value of logged-off lands in Oregon either for agriculture or reforestation, the research department of the Portland forest service headquarters will make a study of this territory. The work will be directed by Forest Examiner J. F. Kummel and will include a survey of methods of logging and fire protection to insure a second crop of timber, possibilities of producing turpentine from native yellow pine and improved methods of handling grazing on the forest ranges.

Commerce Graduates Wanted

Oregon Agricultural College, Feb. 19.—That commerce graduates are in great demand in the business world is shown by the receipt of an offer from the National City Bank of New York city by the school of commerce. The National City bank offers to pay the expenses to New York and a salary while there of one or more students who might desire to take up foreign banking. Selection of candidates is made by members of the commerce faculty. Training is to cover a year's period.
