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**POLITICAL POT BEGINNING TO SIMMER**  
That the political pot in Oregon is already beginning to simmer, and that it will reach the boiling point early in May is now evident. From Sunday's Oregonian these notes are taken:

Legislative politics is opening in the upstate counties and these are indicators of lively contests in some districts. At present, Klamath county is developing candidates and there are already three in sight for the legislature, not to mention C. K. Brandenburg, who will be a candidate for delegate to the republican national convention.

Wilson S. Wiley, city attorney of Klamath Falls, will soon file for nomination for state senator from Klamath, Lake, Crook, Grant and Deschutes counties. Jay Upton, of Prineville, is also preparing to file for this identical nomination. C. Austin Hayden of Klamath Falls, is mentioned as a candidate for nomination for representative for the big joint district to succeed George H. Merryman. There are two representatives for this joint district, Dr. Mertryman and Benton Burdick of Redmond, being the incumbents. While Mr. Hayden is going after Dr. Mertryman's seat, H. J. Overturf, secretary of the commercial club at Bend, is said to be preparing to run against Mr. Burdick for the other nomination.

**Candidates May Have Bans.**  
By grapevine comes the rumor that there may be a combination between Overturf and Hayden and Wiley, by which Klamath Falls will help Overturf, and Bend, reciprocating, will support Hayden and Wiley. And if Mr. Upton or Mr. Wiley wins the republican nomination, he will be opposed in the general election by another Klamath man, George T. Baldwin, democrat, the present state senator.

W. B. Dennis of Carlton, Yamhill county, has decided to eschew the lower house and be a candidate for the senate for the district composed of Yamhill, Washington, Lincoln and Tillamook. This district now has Thomas B. Handley of Tillamook as its state senator, and if Senator Handley wishes to return to the senate there will be an interesting contest. Mr. Dennis is now a representative for Yamhill county and was chairman of the house committee on roads and highways and this committee had charge of the big road programme bills of the 1919 legislature and the 1920 special session. Mr. Dennis is chairman of the Oregon state bureau of mines and geology and a member of the state board of examining engineers.

**They Fleek Into Open**  
W. H. Gore of Medford, joint representative for Jackson and Douglas, will be a candidate to succeed himself. E. V. Carter of Ashland, who has legislative experience and was once speaker, is being urged to be a candidate for the house. Both Ben C. Sheldon and J. A. Westerlund, the Jackson representatives, can expect opposition if Mr. Carter and Frank Wulthers enter the primaries; as is rumored.

As Dr. W. D. Wood, senator for Washington, is considering running for secretary of state, W. G. Hare of Hillsboro, who quit the special session in disgust when his pet paving bill was defeated, intends succeeding Dr. Wood in the senate. Loyal M. Graham of Forest Grove, who made a good record in the house, will be a candidate to succeed himself. Mr. Graham was principal author of the highway bond bills of the last regular and special sessions, as a member of the house committee on roads and highways.

C. J. Edwards of Tillamook and Yamhill is not expected to run again as F. A. Rowe of Nehalem, a former representative, has cast his hat into the ring.  
**Hood River Hatches Brood.**  
Hood River is developing an abundance of candidates. Senator J. R. Nielsen will seek re-election and George M. Sunday is being groomed for the same place, that of joint senator for Wasco and Hood River. Edward W. Van Horn is being put forward for joint representative of the same district. Hood River is ignoring Wasco county, but the latter is expected to try to grab either the position of senator or representative.  
C. Schuebel who, has been one of the extremists in the house for several sessions, aspires to the senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Walter Dimick. Thomas F. Ryan, former county judge and former deputy state treasurer, has announced his candidacy for this position. Judge Ryan is very popular throughout Clackamas county and Mr. Schuebel has always been backed by the votes of the millworkers, so this should make a far from quiet contest.

DEMOCRACY RE-TURNS TO O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Feb. 19.—That strictly formal affairs and dress suits do not promote democracy was the opinion of the majority of the students of the college at the student assembly called for the purpose of discussion of rules revision.

The spirit of democracy has always been one of the outstanding characteristics of the O. A. C. student body and it is the ideal of the older members to keep tradition alive. A committee on rules revision presented a list of suggested changes to present regulations for the approval of the student body. One of the proposed changes was the lifting of the ban on dress suits.

Holding that formal affairs and dress suits tend to divide college society a majority voted against the proposed change in the rule which now prohibits such affairs.  
An editorial in the Barometer, official publication of the student body, holds that "one of the ways to promote democracy is to speak to everybody." Speaking on the campus is an old custom at the college now being revived through the action of a few of the leaders.
