COMBINATION SPRAY POSSIBLE

A way for growers to combine lead arsenate with lime-sulfur spray has been developed by R. H. Robinson of the O. A. C. experiment station. Some way has long been sought by Oregon growers because the cost of putting on one combined spray is only half as much as putting on separate sprays for insects and fungus diseases. Severe chemical reaction has always spoiled their spray by weakening the killing strength and by releasing soluble arsenic that burned the plants. Mr. Robinson has found that the addition of about five pounds of slaked lime to each 100 gallon of lime-sulfur spray before the lead arsenate is added will prevent most of these changes. It is important that the slaked lime be added before the lead arsenate, and thoroughly mixed.

DR. WOOD IS CANDIDATE FOR SECRETARY OF STATE

Speaking of Dr. Wood's candidacy, the Oregonian says:
Dr. W. D. Wood, of Hillsboro, dean of the Oregon state senate, has announced his candidacy for secretary of state. Dr. Wood has tendered his resignation as state senator a position he has held for about 12 years. During most of his experience in the senate the doctor was on the ways and means committee, either as the chairman or as a member, and this placed him in close touch with all the governmental machinery and institutions of the state.

The field of candidates for the republican nomination for secretary of state is large. Those who have announced themselves, beside Dr. Wood, are Sam Koser, C. L. Butler, M. Vernon Parson, Ben F. Jones, Henry J. Schulderman and E. L. Coburn.
Dr. Wood intends stressing the fact that the secretary of state is more than a mere clerical officer, for the secretary is a member of the state board, with the governor and state treasurer, and in this position has to assist in directing the destinies of Oregon. His special fitness to serve on the state board is an argument advanced by the doctor.
