AMERICAN LEGION IS GROWING VERY FAST

Increasing at the rate of a thousand posts a month, the American Legion passed the 8,000 mark the middle of February. In addition to posts in the United States, a report just issued shows one in Canada, one in England, three in France, one in Mexico, one in Panama, three in the Philippines, one in Hawaii and 8 in Cuba.

New York State, with a total of 854 posts heads the list, Illinois coming second with 604 posts; Pennsylvania, third, 522 posts; Iowa, fourth, 443; Minnesota, fifth, 411; Ohio, sixth, 358; Missouri, seventh, 270; Michigan, eighth, 258; Indiana, ninth, 253; and New Jersey, tenth, 245.

The number of posts in the other states on February 17, when American Legion report showed 8,015 posts, were as follows: Alabama, 38; Alaska, 6; Arizona, 28; Arkansas, 105; California, 204; Colorado, 94; Connecticut, 80; Delaware, 19; District of Columbia, 23; Florida, 61; Georgia, 85; Idaho, 98; Kansas, 221; Kentucky, 80; Louisiana, 40; Maine, 93; Maryland, 77; Massachusetts, 244; Mississippi, 79; Montana, 67; Nebraska, 199; Nevada, 19; New Hampshire, 74; New Mexico, 40; North Carolina, 72; North Dakota, 168; Oklahoma, 142; Oregon, 80; Rhode Island, 34; South Carolina, 55; South Dakota, 165; Tennessee, 69; Texas, 154; Utah, 104; Vermont, 79; Virginia, 106; Washington, 130; West Virginia, 84; Wisconsin, 229; Wyoming, 34.

GROVE PEOPLE ATTEND GET-TOGETHER MEET

On Wednesday night of this week a number of people attended the get-together meeting of the Congregational churches of Oregon to hear the plans discussed for the carrying out of the work of raising the Pilgrim Memorial Fund which is now being raised in the United States for the future care of indigent ministers of that denomination. It was at first planned to raise five millions of dollars for this purpose, but owing to the continued increased cost of living it is now proposed to increase the sum to eight millions of dollars and with that end in view this work is being undertaken. Oregon's portion is thirty-five thousand dollars, and there is no doubt but that the state will take care of its portion. The sum will be raised within the membership of the church and those closely related to it. A banquet was served at the Portland Hotel, following which prominent speakers from the East outlined the work to be done.
