this year the very best appearance it has ever made. It is desirable to have the old town as bright and clean as possible, and nothing can help so much in this as fresh paint.

Paint is one of the necessities. Paint is a preservative; therefore, it is economy. Paint is sanitary. Paint destroys the countless millions of germs that infest wood. A rotten timber can produce enough dangerous germs in a day to keep a doctor busy for a month. Hence we conclude that if Beaverton were given a general painting, the health of the community would improve so much that the doctor could go away and enjoy a month of gout without neglecting his patients.

ONLY ONE OF MANY SERVICES

There seems little connection between the Salvation Army and the paper famine. Yet the industrial homes of the Salvation Army annually salvage upwards of 100,000,000 pounds of waste paper to help relieve the shortage.

One newspaper publisher, investigating the work of the Army waste paper harvesters, declared the salvaged paper sent to paper mill last year would print one edition of newspapers with a combined circulation of 1,250,000,000 copies, or supply a newspaper of 3, 424,657 circulation with paper for a year.

This represents the saving of paper alone and takes no cognizance of the work of redeeming men from the gutter and placing them on their feet while they work at baling and sorting the waste paper banded. Hundreds of men who come to the industrial homes of the Salvation Army are given a new viewpoint, healed in body and mind and made over into useful citizens—saved from waste even as they save discarded newspapers and magazines from waste.

During the past ten years these men, while finding renewed manhood, have saved more than three quarters of a million tons of waste paper.

Still there are thousands of tons total loss because the public's aid in conserving waste paper has not been solicited. In Portland hundreds of tons of paper are sorted and baled at the industrial home at 26 Union Avenue.

SUPPORT YOUR SCHOOLS

The State University, the Agricultural College, and the Oregon Normal School now have 5400 fulltime students. The number does not include any of the thousands of short course, correspondence-study, or summer school students. The income from the state for these three institutions has increased only three and eight tenths percent. In seven years, although their attendance has increased 150 percent.

FIGHTING THE SCHOOL BOOK TRUST

Every six years the people in Oregon are "held up" by the School Book Trust. A wholesale change of school books is made, parents are fleeced "in the name of education" and over one million dollars fill up the coffers of the School Book Gang. The average cost per pupil of Grade and High school for new school books since last September has been \$5 each. The school census of Washington County for 1919 was 8289—times \$5 each or \$41,445, for new school books.

The school census of Oregon for 1919 was 207,158—times \$5 or \$1,035,790, for new school books. This is not all, some of the new books are not as good as the old ones.

As a school teacher of Washington County for the past 18 years, I say "knock out this school book graft" and save a million dollars for the children of Oregon every six years.
