MOVES TO GROVE

Victor Rangles, former owner of the brick and tile works here, has moved the remnant of the plant to Forest Grove and will put in a modern plant there. The News-Times this week has the following:

That the Forest Grove Brick and Tile Factory is an assured fact there is no longer doubt. The machinery for the industry arrived the past week and since that time men have been busily engaged in putting in the foundations for the new build-

ings and preparing actively for the work that is to follow.

One of the largest of the numerous buildings that will be erected will be 35 by 65 feet with an addition of 30 by 20 feet later on. There will be six buildings 15 by 150 feet and one building 75 by 100 feet.

Mr. Rangles is now on the job and he informed a News-Times reporter Tuesday that he hopes to have the big plant in operation by May 1st. When the factory is in running order it will be devoted to

the manufacture of common brick, face brick of the highest quality, building blocks and tile.

The new plant is located on ground recently purchased by George Naylor and adjoins the city light and power plant. The clay has been fully analyzed and practically tested and Mr. Rangles declares it to be the very best that he has been able to locate in Oregon.

That there is a crying demand for brick and tile in the whole Willamette valley is demonstrated every day by the scarcity of the products that this big factory will be able to turn out. Ample capital is behind the project and practical men are in charge of the plant and its organization. No bonuses are being asked, but the business is being established on business lines and will be conducted in such a way as to produce the right kind of products and pay dividends to the investors. There will be a number of men on the pay roll from the very beginning which number will be increased as time goes on and the business gets into working order.

This factory should give Forest Grove some mighty good advertising and we hope that those who are interested in starting the plant will reap good results.

THE GASOLINE SITUATION

The Necessity of Conservation
