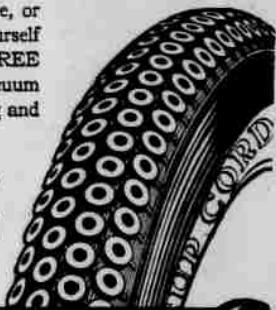

THE CAPITOL

News of General Public Interest at the County Seat.

Mrs. Alberta McMurphy, Worthy Grand Matron of Oregon, made her official visit to Tualatin Chapter, last Wednesday night.

During the past week the following marriage licenses were issued: George Hugo Firtalaff to May Eggleston; Arthur Weber to Genevieve Ewing; E. G. Hagey to Clara Rollick.

The Ray-Maling Co. Inc., filed papers with the county clerk last week. The incorporators are H. W. Ray, B. E. Maling and C. F. Noakes and \$100,000 in stock will be the capital of the new cannery company. It is rather expected that some of the stock will be sold locally.

Mrs. C. H. Castner, of Hood River, gave a talk before the Hillsboro Club, to which everyone was invited, on Educational Measures before the voters. The talk was most interesting and instructive. Mrs. Castner was last week entertained by our local Eastern Star Chapter, she being Grand Associate Conductress.

W. V. Bergen, of this city, has been appointed director for Washington county for the united simultaneous campaign under the direction of the Interchurch World Movement, which will run from April 25 to May 2.

Jane C. Allen, state advisory nurse and organizer of public health, nursing for the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, has gone to Atlanta, to attend the meeting of the American Nurses' Association, the National Organization of Jubilee Health Nurses and the National League of Nursing Education, which are in session this week. She will also attend the meeting of the National Tuberculosis Association, which will be held in St. Louis, Mo., next week.

At a recent meeting of the Hillsboro club it was decided to hold a special election in June to decide whether or not the city shall issue bonds for \$15,000 to improve the Shute Park. An architect has furnished the city with a draft of a pavilion that will have a floor space of 71x117 feet and in pleasant weather can be so arranged as to be all open, as the doors can slide up, or in bad weather they can be let down. The building will cost \$10,000 and it is expected that the grounds will be improved with the remaining \$5,000. Everyone seems to be in favor of the proposition.

The funeral of Thomas H. Elliott, occurred in this city Monday of last week at the Methodist church. Burial in the Masonic cemetery. Mr. Elliott, many years ago, resided in this city, and it was he who built the first brick court house in Hillsboro. His father, Samuel Elliott, was also a contractor. He is survived by his wife and a son and daughter, all of Portland and his mother and three brothers. He was born in Glencoe, Oregon, in December, 1856.

The announcement of the coming marriage on May 5, of Miss Rosemary Bowden Shipworth, daughter of Rev. Walton Shipworth, of this city, to Alfred Lorenzo Mansfield, of Portland, was made last week. Dr. H. J. Talbot, president of Kimball school of Theology, of Salem, will perform the ceremony in the First Methodist church of Portland. Miss Shipworth is a highly educated and accomplished young lady. Mr. Mans-

field has been in the employ of the Meier & Frank store since a mere boy and now holds the position as assistant manager of the drapery department. They will make their home in Portland.

Living Conditions in Poland Graphically Described by Miss Lois Downs, Executive of the Y. W. C. A. Workers.

Poland is a nation which after five and a half years of war, is dazed with suffering, shell shocked. Moreover, Poland is still at war. It is holding 1500 kilometers of front against the Bolsheviks.

In the last few years no building has gone on in its cities, and Warsaw is frightfully overcrowded. In a model working man's house in Warsaw, one room is set aside for each family. The girls who work live in what they call "corners," that is, they have a straw mattress in the corner of a room which is occupied by the family with which they live.

Work is done in Poland by entirely untrained girls. Russia gave but little training to Polish girls, and nursing has had to be done by daughters of the old aristocracy who have gone out from the shelter of their homes to serve. One such girl is now in charge of a whole hospital. She had two weeks preliminary training in nursing. I visited a sanitary train which was to go out on the East front. Each girl took care of fifteen severely wounded men with no real preliminary training. On this train there was no linen. Most of the beds had one dirty blanket; some had none at all. Provision for the living quarters for the girls who were working on the train was terrible. Before the war these girls had never been allowed to walk on the street alone.

RELIGIOUS RIGHTS

Contrivances, Still Handy in Twentieth Century, Found Sculptured in the Ruins of Nineveh.

Umbrellas are by no means a modern contrivance. They are found sculptured on the monuments of Egypt and in the ruins of Nineveh and their use in China and India is very ancient. In Greece they had a part in certain religious ceremonies and there is no doubt from the paintings on ancient Greek vases that umbrellas, very much like those in use at the present day, were known centuries before the Christian era. They were also used among the Romans, but only by women.

The umbrella also seems to have been a part of the insignia of royalty, as is still the case in many parts of Asia and Africa. An English dictionary published in 1708, defines an umbrella as a "screen commonly used by women to keep off the rain."

Umbrellas were introduced in America in the early part of the 18th century, but their use at first was considered effeminate to carry one.

Jonas Hanaway is said to be the first man who walked the streets of London with an open umbrella over his head to keep off the rain. He is said to have used it for 30 years before they came into general use for this purpose.
